**War Camp Community Service**

A full discussion of fall and winter activities for Soldiers and Sailors will be the subject for the next meeting of the North Shore Hostesses to be held at the Y. W. C. A. Hostess House, Camp Dewey, Great Lakes, Monday morning, September 9th, at 10:30. Miss Mary Wood Hinman and Mr. Eugene T. Lies, newly appointed organizer for the War Recreation Board of Illinois will present the latest developments in plans for all forms of hospitality. These meetings are always most inspiring and usually well attended. All Highland Park hostesses should make it a point to be present next Monday if possible.

Each week brings some new feature of interest and benefit to the active little Army and Navy Centre on Central Avenue. This week it is the announcement that arrangements are being completed for keeping a limited number of Jackies over night in Highland Park. The women of the Christian Science Comforts Committee, who have rooms over the Post Office, have offered the rooms for cots on Saturday nights so that it will not be necessary for the boys to return to Great Lakes after parties and dinners. Information regarding these accommodations may be had from Mr. Harris at the Centre.

Miss Priscilla Carver, who has had charge of the games at the Parish House on Saturday evenings for the soldiers and sailors who do not dance, is going to be so busy with her concert programs that it is impossible for her to continue as Chairman of that activity. The War Recreation Board, recognizing the splendid thing that has been done by her, has employed a Play Director to come to Highland Park to reside permanently to carry on the work, and to further organize the girls in hostess work. She will arrive this week and be in charge of the games this Saturday evening.

Miss Carver will continue her work at the Fort Sheridan hospital entertainments for convalescent men on Sunday evenings. These evenings are a source of great pleasure and inspiration to the men who are not able to go out for their recreation. The new easy chairs recently supplied the recreation room are always everyone filled by semi invalids listening eagerly to songs or monologues. Mrs. F. B. Green gave a program of her deliciously witty dialect stories a short time ago, and the boys voted her one of the best of the season.

The plea entered last week for needs by the Army and Navy Centre met with ready response as usual. The second fine billiard table is already installed and the only thing preventing a third is lack of space. The needed teaspoons were given but we still lack two inexpensive tablecloths.

Miss McKenzie announces the Hospitality Room at Camp Perry now completed, and as restful and attractive as such rooms at the Detention Camp should be. Bright Cretonne curtains, downy dull blue pillows on the soft couch, comfortable brown reed chairs and a reading table supplied with late magazines furnish a cheery invitation for rest to the mothers, wives, sisters or sweethearts of the boys in detention. The Army and Navy Centre Committee desires to thank Miss McKenzie for so completely discharging this branch undertaking at Great Lakes.

An ironing board with electric iron is a new institution at the Centre, so the boys may present a "properly pressed" appearance at evening suppers and parties after a day of sports on the beach or tennis courts.

The church suppers have been discontinued for the time being to give the women who have labored so faithfully a chance for a little vacation before the fall season ahead. The boys will miss these fine suppers and sing, led by Mr. Booth and his little daughter, Elizabeth, who has become a great favorite with the boys, but when the contemplated changes at Fort Sheridan have been completed and we know how many men we are to have with us the churches will resume their activity.

The earnings of the treasurer's office in Lake county for ten years previous to McDonough's term were \$28,101.05 and for the four years of McDonough's term the earnings were \$90,453.75, every dollar of which latter amount has gone to the county, as shown by the past audits of his office.
