ODD FELLOWS LINE UP

President Wilson in his address headed, "My Fellow Countrymen," points out clearly that the tendency of some of the people to "take the law into their own hands" in the form of mobs are as much an enemy of democracy as the forces fighting us in the enemy lines in Europe. If we fail to keep the machinery of the Government going smoothly at home while our invincible military forces win this war in France, we can claim but puny loyalty. It is our duty to maintain order at home while our young men are making supreme sacrifices for the very principles of self-government that mobs would destroy.

The Sheridan Lodge adopted the following resolutions at a recent meeting:

WHEREAS, The President of our country has called attention to the tendency on the part of some thoughtless people to encourage mob law, and,

WHEREAS, Mobs never correct wrongs, never enforce law, but are law-breakers themselves, and

WHEREAS, We are opposed to lawlessness of whatever nature, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That Sheridan Lodge No. 662, Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Illinois will co-operate actively and watchfully with the constituted authorities, local and State, to the end that the good name of our community shall not be violated by mobs, no matter what excuse may be offered, and further,

RESOLVED, That the members of this lodge, singly and collectively, tender their services to the authorities and stand ready to respond instantly in the support of law enforcement, and the discouragement of mobs in attempting to supplant constitutional authority, the very foundation of our civil liberty.

11. Boys under 18 who are graduates of an accredited high school, may enter the University as matriculated students, enroll for military training with the S. A. T. C., and begin their college work but must pay the regular fees and provide for their own maintenance as usual until they are inducted into regular membership in the S. A. T. C., which may be done after they reach their eighteenth birthday.

12. For women, and for men not in the S. A. T. C., the University maintains its regular courses of study, with minor modifications, and offers also special war courses for women in Red Cross work, nursing, sanitary science, food conservation, operation of farm tractors, seed inspection, poultry production, gardening, milk and cream testing, etc.

Government Orders

EVERY SUBSCRIBER SHOULD READ THE ORDER CAREFULLY

Every Newspaper in the Country has Received the Following Official Order from the War Industries Board: "Discontinue Sending Paper After Date of Expiration of Subscription Unless Subscription is Renewed and Paid for Within Three Months." (This Ruling Goes Into Effect Oct. 1, '18.)

This means that all outstanding accounts (or arrearages) must be paid, and that no paper in the United States can be sent by mail unless paid for in advance.

In the past the Press has allowed subscribers to owe for a year and in some cases longer. Under the new order all must pay in advance if they wish the paper sent them. We have no voice in the matter. It is a Government order.

The label on your paper will show to what date your subscription is paid. If it is not now paid in advance, please attend to the matter at once.

The Government has laid down the rule that we must follow. We ask you to co-operate with us in carrying it out.
