INFLUENZA RULES BY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

SIMPLE METHODS ADVISED

Penalty for Violating \$200 Fine or Six Months in Jail or Both for Each Of-

The Illinois State Department of Public Health has issued rules and regulations for the control of influenza which, briefly summarized, are as follows:

1. Immediate reports, to local health officers of all cases known or suspected by physicians and others with immediate quarantine of reported cases. (Call City Hall, H. P.

2. Isolation of patients for three days after all symptoms have disappeared.

3. Wearing of face masks by attendants.

4. Burning or disinfecting of all articles coming in contact with discharges coming from mouth, nose or throat of patient,

5. Visiting on premises where case exists prohibited.

6. Placarding and absolute quarantine of all places not observing above rules.

How to Treat Influenza

1. If you get a cold go to bed in a well ventilated room. Keep warm. 2. Keep away from other people. Do not kiss anyone. Use individual towels, handkerchiefs, etc.

3. Every case of influenza should go to bed at once under care of a physician. The, patient should stay in bed at least three days after fever has disappeared.

4. Patient must not cough or sneeze except when a mask or handkerchief is held over the face.

5. Keep in warm, well ventilated 5. The great danger is from pneu-

monia. Avoid it by staying in bed while actually ill and until convalescence is fully established. 7. The after effects of influenza

are worse than the disease. Take care of yourself.

8. Strictly observe the state and city rules and regulations for the control of influenza.
