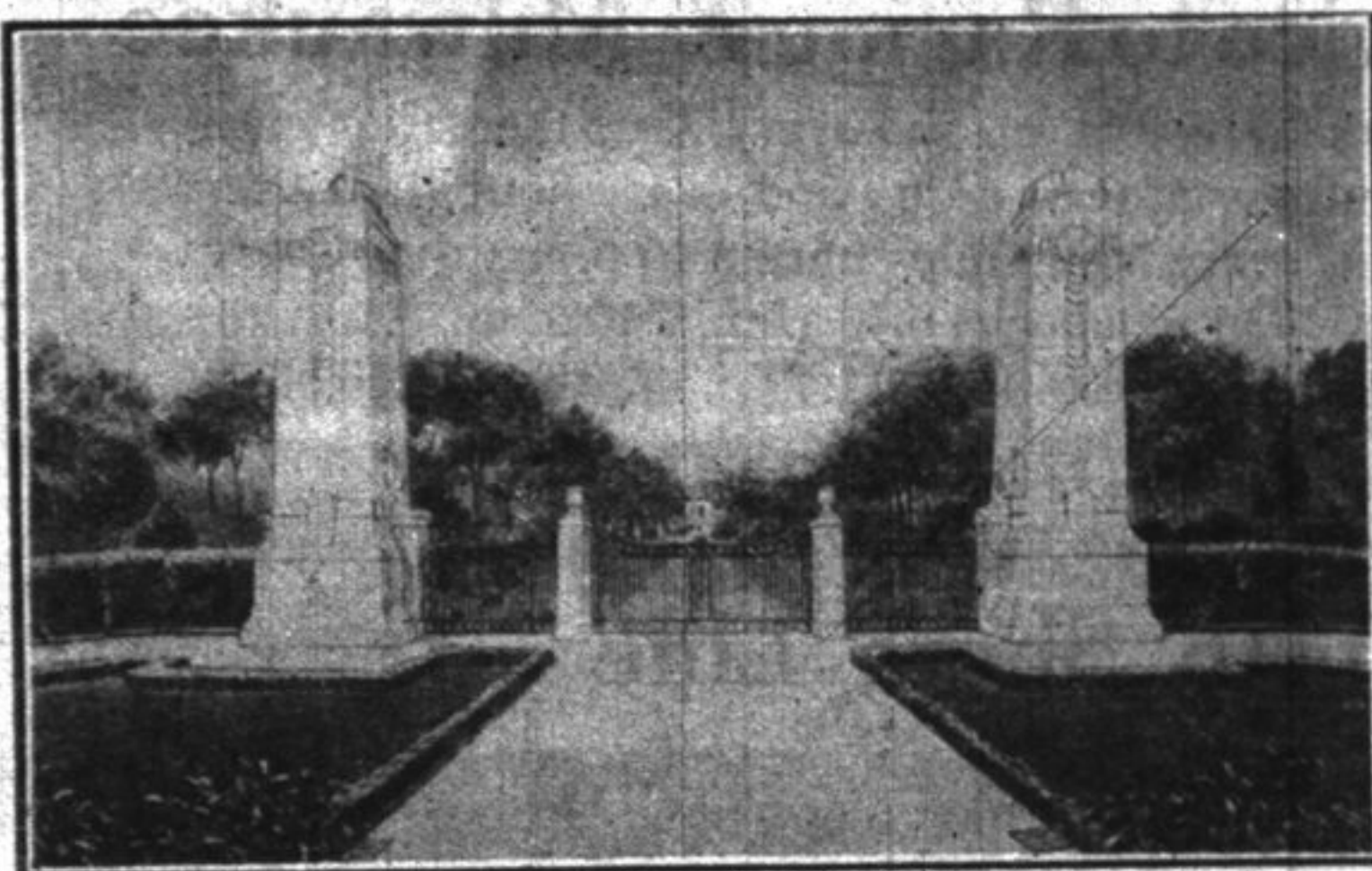

She was much pleased with her pleasant room as she lay there ill with pneumonia and her family and friends were greatly shocked at the arrival of Death that night, (Monday, September 30th), between eleven and twelve o'clock.

Mourning her loss are husband, young son, father, mother, sister and large circle of devoted friends. Her sister, Miss Helen M. Mayer, arrived in Highland Park from North Carolina, Wednesday morning. Beautiful in all home relations, as mother, wife and daughter, and very resourceful and winning socially hers was a rare personality that could ill be spared from the busy walks of life.

The funeral was private and interment was made at North Shore Cemetery.
