**MAKE BANDAGES FOR EPIDEMIC FIGHTERS**

The Red Cross rooms at the Presbyterian church were never so crowded as on last Sunday and Monday when both men and women responded to the emergency call, made through the pulpits of Highland Park for volunteers to make bandages for the epidemic fighters in Chicago. Material for five thousand bandages was sent to this city; and on Monday 1050 were turned in. On Tuesday afternoon the remainder, making a total of 5500 bandages answered the call.

On Sunday afternoon men helped in the work room as well as women. Mr. Jesse L. Smith, Messrs. Ruffner, Rigdon, Bletsch, Patton, H. S. Vail, George Mason, and many others took off their Sunday coats, rolled up their shirt sleeves, cut tape and made themselves generally useful. WGA men and women both working. It was evident that the rooms wore a look of domestic felicity never known before. A Jackie who was staying over night as the guest of Rev. Pitt, volunteered his services and instead of visiting, worked on bandages all afternoon and evening. People worked until ten o'clock at night both Sunday and Monday, and those who could not come to the shop, took their quota home with them. Even little Sunday evening neighborhood parties in several instances, resolved themselves into separate working units, set up tables, and spent the evening in clipping and folding.

Truly the war and the various calls to service recall the more picturesque days of the Pilgrim fathers when it was necessary that people banded together in mutual dependence to protect themselves against their enemies and the ravages of disease.
