**FORMER HIGHLAND PARK
RESIDENT DIES**

Mr. George M. Millard Died Nov. 6
In Pasadena, Cal. Was Head of
McClurg's Rare Book Dept.

George M. Millard, a former resident of this city, and for years head of the rare book department of McClurg's, died November 6th, in South Pasadena, California. During his residence in this city he owned the home, now occupied by the Hoynes family on Sycamore Place.

Mr. Millard, who was about 70 years old, died on November 6. He is known by collectors of rare books throughout the nation. He was one of Eugene Field's best friends. He was also a friend of Dr. Frank W. Gunsaulus, George M. Chandler, owner of an old book shop on Van Buren between Wabash Avenue and State Street; Walter M. Hill, book collector at 22 East Washington street, and many others. He was one of the organizers of the Caxton club and was one of the literary coterie which Field dubbed "The Saints and Sinners Corner" that used to meet at McClurg's old store at Madison street and Wabash Avenue.

Mr. Millard left this city about five years ago to reside in South Pasadena, where he continued to carry on his old book business. The widow, Mrs. Alice M. Millard, and a daughter, Roxana, and a brother, Mr. William Millard, survive.

**\$80,000 FOR GOOD ROADS
NEAR NAVAL STATION**

Improvements to be Made as Soon
as Weather Permits in
the Spring

The Navy Department has allotted \$80,000 for the development of highways adjacent to the Great Lakes station. Pursuant to this allotment the navy will undertake the maintenance of the following roads:

That portion of Sheridan Road between the south line of Camp Perry and 22nd street, North Chicago, as well as the continuation of Sheridan Road west of Camp Luce.

The highway connecting Sheridan Road and Green Bay Road at Five Points.

The highway running northeast from Five Points as far as the present cement pavement on Morrow Avenue.

It is proposed to put the present pavements in good condition immediately, and, as soon as weather permits in the spring, to concrete the roads.
