LAKE COUNTY FOREST PRESERVE LOOMS AGAIN. Continued from Page 1

together from every town in the county to organize the Lake County Forest Preserve Committee, believes in immediate resumption of the forest preserve campaign, and tells of the step which must be taken to secure the preserve.

"People are turning back with a sigh of relief to civic pursuits," says Mr. Millard.

"We have learned one thing, if we have learned nothing else from the war, namely, that it is desirable to do something for the public good on a large scale we can do it and that we can raise the money with which to do it.

"The proposed Lake County Forest Preserve is a plan not only for future but for present recreational grounds, even before it becomes a vital necessity because of the growth in population. We will be able today to use these proposed recreational

(Continued from Page One) areas which are to be set aside as the regular playgrounds for the children of future generations.

"The Cook County Forest Preserve has been organized for a long enough time to demonstrate its great contribution to the civic betterment of Cook county. I believe it is fully as important for Lake County to have its forest preserve as for Cook County or any other community to have room for its expansion. It takes but a few generations for people to be deprived of their vitality if kept from the soil.

"The process of securing the preserve would be to file a petition before the county court asking for an election to be held at which the people would decide whether or not they wish to organize areas of the county or whatever territory they may deem proper to be organized into a forest preserve.

"Should the vote be affirmative, the county board of supervisors will constitute the board of commissioners for the Forest Preserve District. This board of commissioners would proceed with the selection and purchase of suitable areas to be preserved for the scenic and recreational value. Whatever may be the areas so far recommended, the final selection will be made by the board of commissioners after the district has been organized.

"Right now, it appears to me, is the time to organize. I believe it would be the most popular movement submitted to the voters for a long time."

It will be recalled that prominent citizens from North Chicago, Lake Bluff, Zion City, Wauconda, Fox River, Lake Zurich, Highland Park, Lake Forest, Waukegan, Lake Villa, Libertyville, Wadsworth, Round Lake, and other places in the county were among those who organized the committee.

The proposed campaign was sidetracked in the interest of winning the war with undivided attention. A little publicity was given by the courtesy of the press of the county to keep the matter occasionally before the minds of the people.

The movement was fostered by such people as Scott Keith, J. W. Barwell, Fred W. Buck, and C. H. King of Waukegan; Jens Jensen, prominent landscape architect, E. L. Ryerson, Stanley Field and others of Lake Forest and Mrs. Julius Rosenwald of Highland Park.

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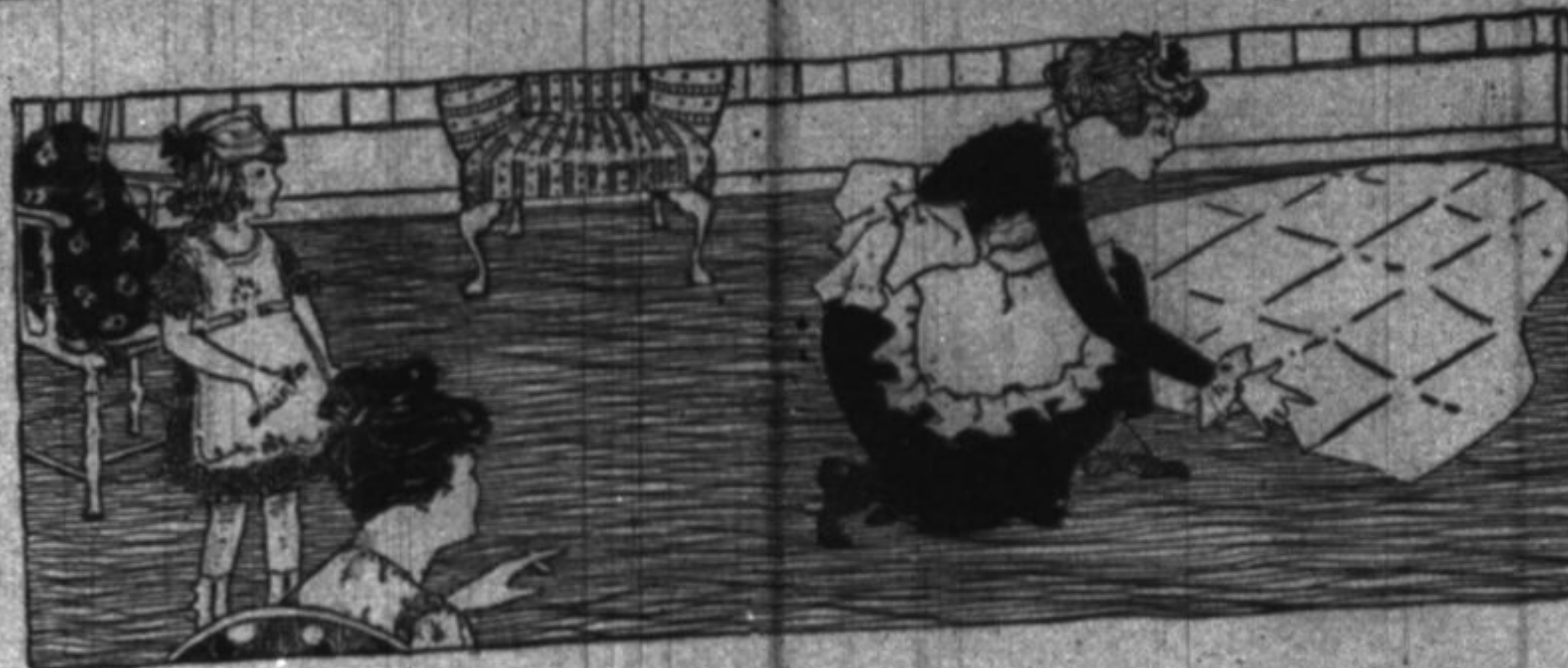

URGE HOT LUNCH FOR THE SCHOOL CHILDREN

Plan to Have Girls Prepare One Warm Dish at Noon. To Get Credit

County Superintendent of Schools T. A. Simpson of Waukegan and Miss Peck from the University of Illinois, are visiting country schools for the purpose of interesting teachers and parents in the subject of warm lunches for school children.
