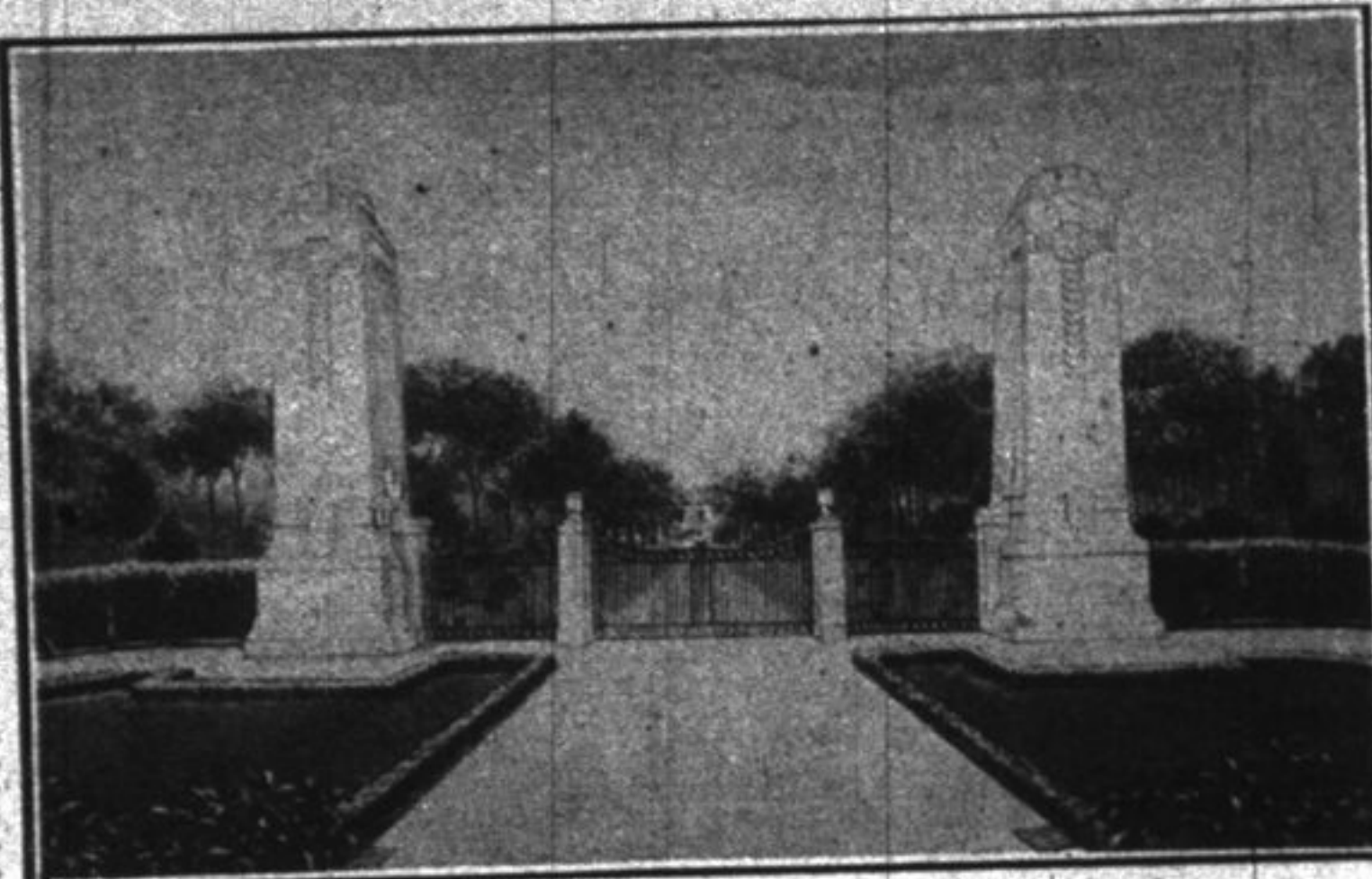

A PROCLAMATION

The following proclamation has been issued by Governor Lowden: Citizens of Illinois:
