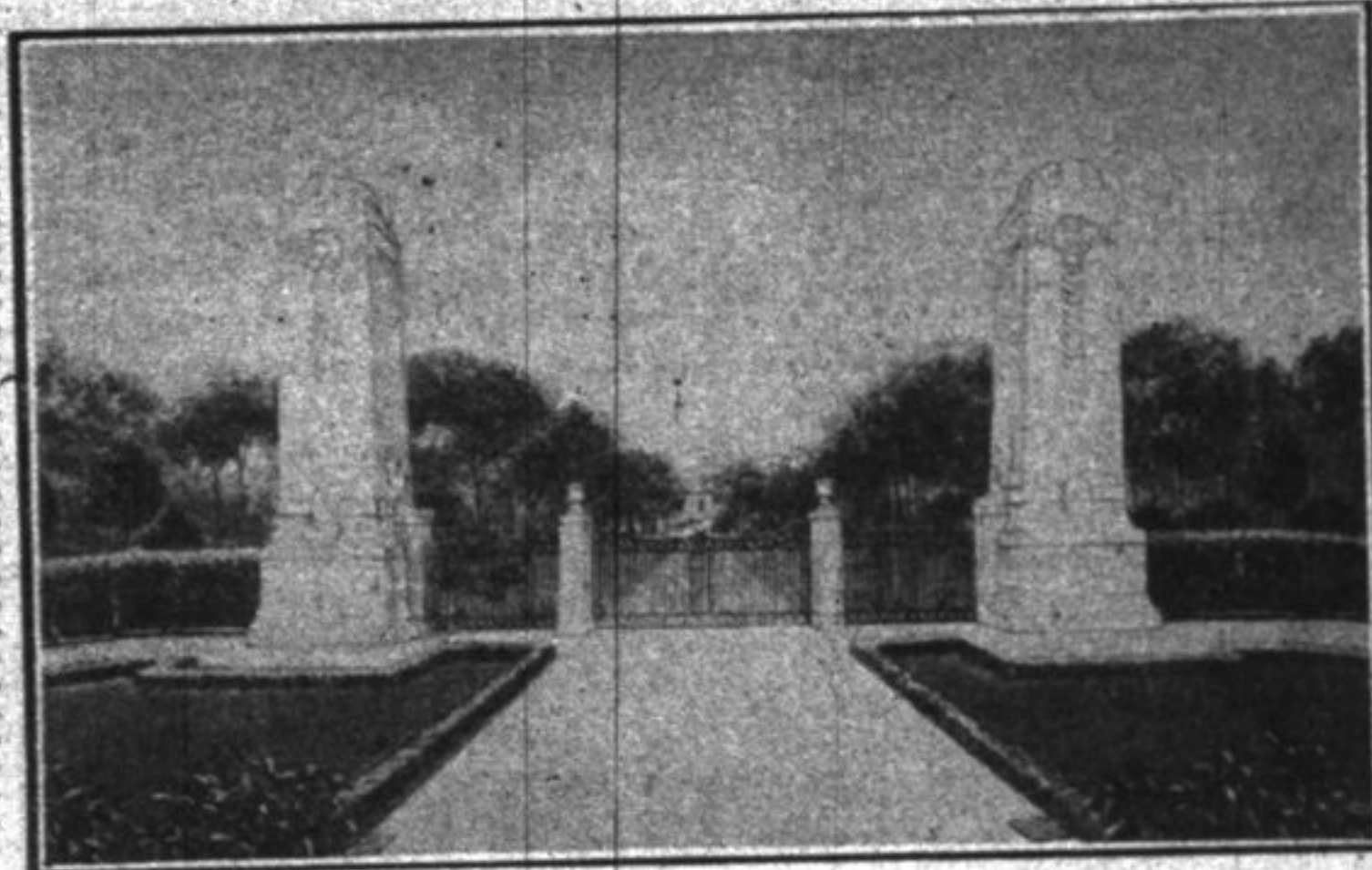

The Centenary

The great Centenary movement in the Methodist Episcopal Church is now getting well under way and is gaining momentum with the passing days. The local churches throughout Methodism are feeling the new life that is coming to them as the result of putting on the Centenary in the local church. This is the altogether surprising, pleasing, and, in not a few instances, the unexpected result of putting on the entire program. This is due to the comprehensiveness of the plan. When carried out faithfully, the local congregation is thoroughly organized and every member linked up to a task not only worthy but wholly and easily within the power of each member to perform. The pastor calls the attention of all Methodists to a few things weighty enough in themselves to command more than passing attention:

1. Methodism ever has been and is destined for all time to be a great evangelistic force. The Centenary with its almost faultless program is Divinely decreed to fan the evangelistic fire into a great conflagration. Not in the form of a great revival effort as such, but by linking each member so closely to the great Commission of the Christ (Matt. 28:19-20, and Acts 1:8) that shall be continuous and perpetual. Thus will the former power of the church be restored.

2. Added to the evangelistic program is one of the most carefully worked out programs of social service. Already this department of applied Christianity has wrought little less than miracles in the new social order. But these days of reconstruction offer still greater opportunities for the practical application of the social teachings of Jesus.

We merely mention the far reaching missionary plans of the church which the Centenary contemplates in the raising of \$80,000,000. No one doubts the raising of this amount of money. The question of peculiar and vital interest is WHAT BENEFIT SHALL HIGHLAND PARK METHODISM GET OUT OF THIS MOVEMENT? Most naturally just about as much as we put into it. Already the Centenary has authorized a fine sum for the work here. How shall we receive it? By doing our part of the work. By putting into operation the Centenary program for the local Church, and so enter into fellowship with our people all over the world. The pastor calls upon all Methodist people in the city to join us in putting our work where it belongs. To highly resolve with us that the church shall no longer hold a negligible position. That the work among the sick, shattered and wounded at Fort Sheridan shall receive at our hands those ministrations that we are expected to render and which we are logically in a position to give.

A local council is being formed. The parish is being divided into units with unit leaders. A complete membership and constituency roll will soon be made. Four assistants for carrying out the work of the units are soon to be nominated. This work includes Intercession, Stewardship, Education and Life Service. We urge you to join us in this work. You are urged to come to the Wednesday evening, Sunday morning and evening services.
