You are gone from our America, Teddy. A little clot in the human mechanism has been the instrument of severing your great spirit from the land and the people you loved. But only Death alone could have induced you to leave us when we need you so, for your interest was always "pure United States." And if, in all the darkness of this moment, there is one little ray of light, it is the solemn pride which is ours that your noble spirit -the greatest of this generation-was cast in the American mold, that it was sent to us for habitation and home, and will go down in history stamped-American.

But you are gone-our advocate, our leader, and our flaming sword. No longer will you run ahead of this generation and warn us of lurking peril and hidden pitfall. Throughout this war you have watched over our nation as a father watches over his sick child. And often enough that child has been petulant, has turned you away, has felt confidence enough to rise in its strength and walk alone, but always you have remained at your post day and night. Although the attending physician had all the authority still your father-heart only asked to be permitted to stand aside and keep the lonely vigil of love in the silent watches of the night. And all the while your sentient ear was trained to every slight vibration that might portend danger to the stricken one.

And we? O! we were busy with a thousand things. The papers teemed with news of great world history that read like an Arabian Nights entertainment. Our lives were rounded like a dream with duties, pleasures, fears. But in flashes from those daily papers, we saw your name appearing-not this time in headlines-but attached to some word of warning, advice, or timely opinion. And 'twas then that those who marked your course and loved you, knew that you were still watching and that the sun would never go down upon your viligence until your country was well and once more on its feet.

No truer American lived since the days of Lincoln and none more truly beloved by those who loved you. The heart of Lincoln was one of brooding tenderness over the people he loved; he sorrowed over their needs, and suffered with them. But you loved America fiercely and fought single-handed every foe as a lioness would fight for her young. Your hands were clean and you dared to stand alone and defy all enemies of a humanitarian America. When a man is right he can afford to stand alone; when he is wrong, let him look to the pack.

Your great physical strength and moral rectitude were the very essence and apotheosis of America and her rugged pioneer traditions. You offered yourself and your four sons for your country's necessity, keeping back nothing wishing for nothing beyond the privilege of service in the hour of need. The youngest son with thousands of others paid the last full measure of devotion and America lived. But now!

"O Captain! my Captain! our fearful trip is done,

The ship has weathered every rack, the prize we sought is won. Exult, O shores, and ring, O bells!

But I with mournful tread, Walk the deck my captain lies Fallen cold and dead."


