**Wounded Men Entertained**

Twenty-five wounded men from Ft. Sheridan were entertained by the members of the Dix Amies Club, which is composed largely of business girls, on Tuesday evening, February 11. The evening was spent in playing games, doing "stunts," and dancing. Refreshments were served, which carried out the idea of St. Valentine's Day. The Y. W. C. A. assembly room was attractively decorated with strings of hearts and valentines.

**Interesting Meeting**

What has been accomplished by the five Senior and four Junior clubs of the Y. W. C. A. was reported at the annual meeting last Friday evening.

The Rainbow Club reported on the sewing which has been done for the Navy League, the parties which have been given to men in uniform, the flowers which have been sent to Ft. Sheridan, and the new plan of sewing for and giving parties for some of the children of the orphanage.

The Dix Amies club reported on the methods which have been used to raise money to provide a week's vacation for seven girls at the Y. W. C. A. camp at Druce Lake last summer; on the Halloween festivities; the box of candy which had been sent to the Orphanage at Lake Bluff at Christmas time; and the party recently given for wounded men.

The Friendship club reported the formation of the dancing class which is being conducted on Tuesday evenings; the entertainments for men in uniform; and the service work which they have done for the Red Cross.

The Aster girls told especially about the Christmas which they had given to a poor family in the city; and about the large amount of work which they have done for the fatherless children of France. These girls have taken a great interest in the basket ball practice which is being held at the high school.

The Entre Nous club which has been recently organized, gave its plans for giving a short play within a few weeks, and for its athletic activities, and also reported on its part in a recent entertainment for wounded men.
