Deerfield sprang into the lead early in the game, due principally to the basket shooting ability displayed by Schreurs, and to the free throws made by Olson. Olson kept up his good work on free throws, scoring five points in the second half, while Schreurs caged three more field goals, and Bell dropped in two. The entire team showed up well. Ritta at guard played a splendid game, guarding his basket very well indeed against the New Trier basket tossers. Morgan, as usual, was one of the fastest men on the floor. SIXTY OPERATIONS IN 3 MONTHS AT HOSPITAL

Dear Sir:—
It may interest some of your readers to know that during the month of December the Highland Park hospital, took care of an average of 14 6/10 patients per day. There were five operations and three births during the month. In January an average of 12 persons per day were cared for, and there were two births and thirty operations. In the first 18 days of the present month of February there have been cared for an average of 13 patients per day, and in that time there have been four births and 15 operations.

Mr. McNeill was born in Grifkocown, Scotland, in 1832, making him 87 years, three months and 25 days old at the time of his death.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 8:30 at the Immaculate Conception Church, with Rev. J. D. O'Neill officiating. Interment will be made in Lake Forest Cemetery.

Mr. McNeill leaves to survive him a widow, and three sons, Dan, Hugh and Douglas; also six grandchildren.
