A company of Arabs gave \$800 to the Red Cross upon Mr. Strickler's solicitation and an Arab named his son "Y.M.C.A." in compliment to the organization. Mr. Strickler leaves next month for the North Indian Mission where he has been assigned by the Presbyterian Board.
