ing Guns. They are the guns that go up with the Infantry and are used for machine gun nests and snipers. It is called the sacrifice squad and it looked as though there ought to be some excitement and there sure was. I was up there for three days and while we were not up at the front lines we lived in a wonderful German dugout that the Huns had intended using for their winter home but we figured that we needed it. It was divided into rooms and each room had its stove for cooking as well as keeping warm and all along the back were two tiers of bunks. So you see the Huns were very thoughtful in having such a nice place fixed up for us.

We had the pleasure every morning of going up to the guns about three o'clock and on the way up, which usually meant a heavy barrage from Jerry we had to pick our way around the dead which was far from being pleasant. Many a night I have travelled around alone and ran around the dead Jerrys that the buch hadn't had time to bury, but they never laid out very long. The

officers always saw to it that the dead were buried as soon as possible. You know how I was finally sent back to the hospital so I will wait until my next letter and then give you some of the little experiences I have left out of this letter.

Hoping that this letter will be appreciated as much as I intend it to be, I remain,

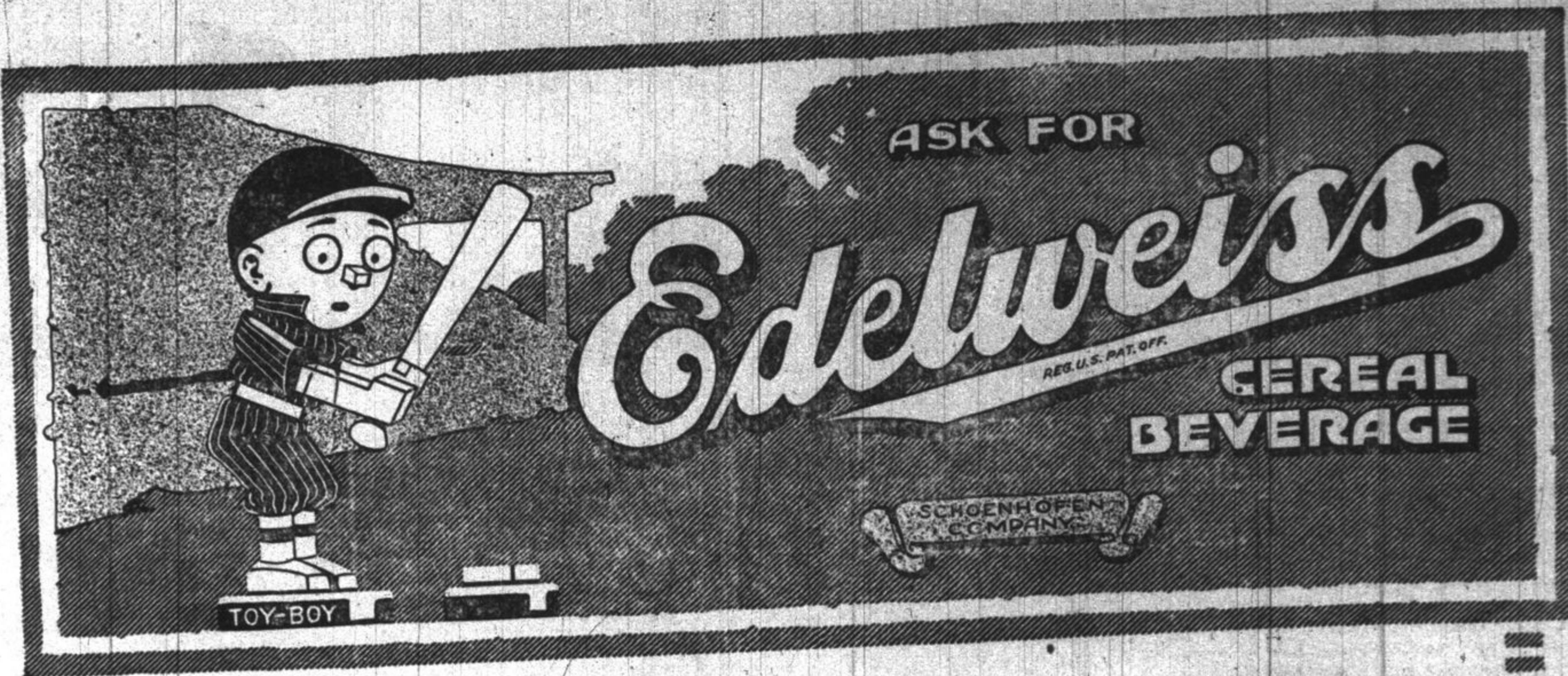

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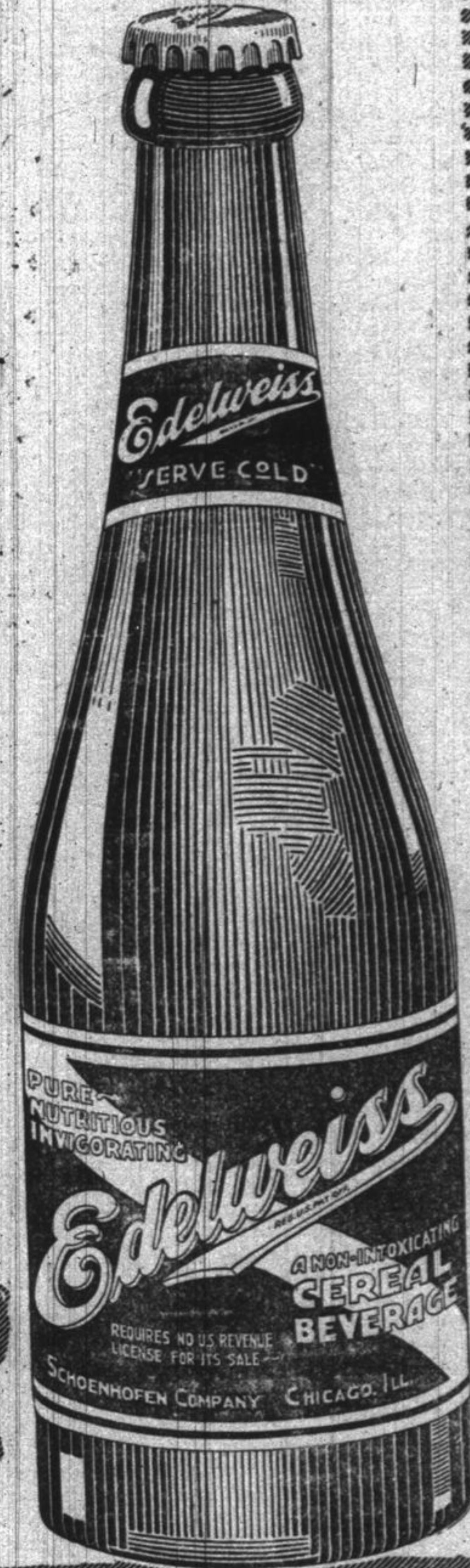
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
