The principal soprano parts will be taken by Miss Burmeister, Miss Farnam and Miss Tale, contralto by Mrs. Sherman and Mrs. Riddle, tenor by Mr. Arthur Craft and Dr. Newhall and baritone, Mr. Ranous and Mr. Herrick. In addition there will be a large chorus.

The Crucifixion is the most beautiful and impressive of all the Lenten cantatas and this promises to be an unusually fine performance. A cordial invitation is extended to all music lovers to be present.

Holy week begins with Palm Sunday, April 13th, and the performance of Stainer's "Crucifixion" by the choir of Trinity Church assisted by the Lake Forest choir, at four o'clock that afternoon will be an impressive introduction to the solemnities of the week.

In addition to the usual Lenten services there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings at 9:30 o'clock. On Maundy Thursday as on the other Thursdays in Lent the same service will be celebrated.

On Good Friday there will be Matins and Litany at 9:30. The Three Hours from noon to three o'clock, a service for children at five o'clock and a service with an address in the evening at eight.

On Saturday, Easter Even, there will be a special baptism of children at five o'clock.

On Easter Day there will be eucharists at 7:30, 9:30 and 11 o'clock and the children's Easter festival at 4:30 p. m.
