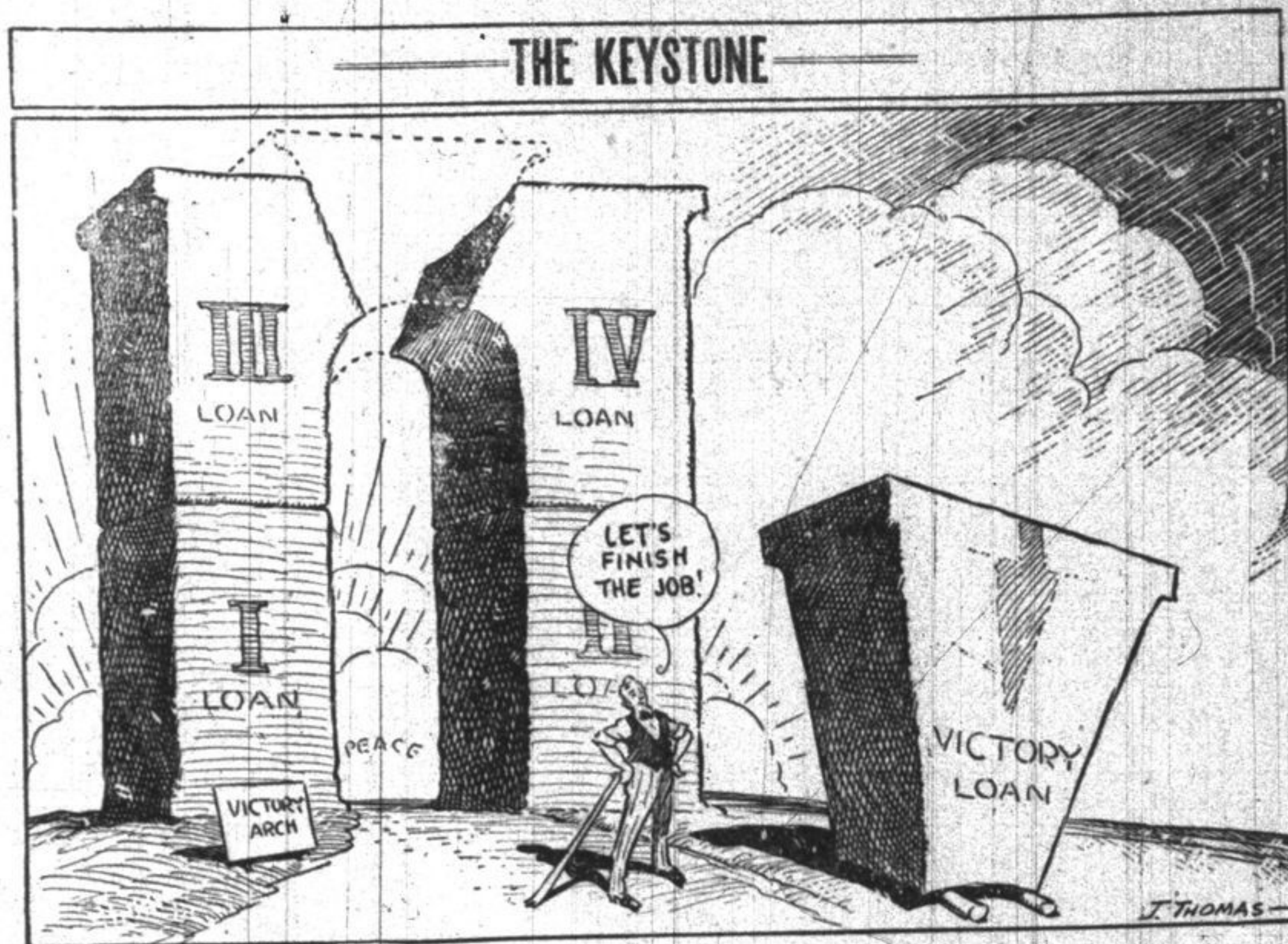
## B. W. SCHUMACHER MEETS WITH AUTO ACCIDENT

## JOHN MEYERS ELECTED MAYOR OF HIGHWOOD

### HUSTVEDT ELECTED CLERK

A Tie Vote in Second Ward Between Thomas E. Welsh and Albert Olson for Alderman

The Highwood election which has been looked forward to with considerable interest by surrounding towns, resulted in the re-election of John Meyers for Mayor, David Hustvedt for city clerk, and Richard O'Connor for city treasurer. The aldermen elected are Ray Crandall in the first ward and Robert G. Botner in the third ward. In the second ward there were several poorly marked ballots for alderman which were challenged by both the leading candidates, Albert Olson and Thomas E. Welsh. Apparently both candidates received 73 votes but the matter will be decided when the canvass of the votes is made at the council meeting next Tuesday evening. Following is the total vote:

For mayor, John Meyers, 228; Joseph Severson, 140; for city clerk, David A. Hustvedt, 224; John H. Nichols, 147; for city treasurer, Richard O'Connor, 238. (unopposed); for alderman 1st ward, Ray Crandall, 43; John V. Garrity, 22; for alderman 2nd ward, Albert Olson 73, Thomas Welsh 73 and Raymond L. Unbehau 46; for alderman 3rd ward, Martin Anderson 53, Henry Smith 19, and Robert G. Botner 58.

## WAR EXHIBIT TRAIN TOURING ILLINOIS

Victory Liberty Loan to Get Unique Advertising Throughout the State

A special War Exhibit train is touring Illinois towns in the interest of the Victory Liberty Loan campaign under the direction of the publicity department of the War Loan organization. The train left Chicago Monday morning, April 14, at 5 o'clock. It was accompanied by a military band which will give concerts at each stopping place.

The first stop was at Woodstock on Monday and the tour will wind up with the last exhibition at Joliet, on May 5. Nearly one hundred towns will be visited during the three weeks trip, and at many towns and cities special Victory Liberty Loan rallies will be held, with addresses by well known speakers.

The train is carrying a large collection of war trophies captured by the American Expeditionary Forces, and there are also many exhibits of the latest types of modern cannon, machine guns, airplanes, and ammunition. The war trophies include cannon, airplanes, rifles, helmets, and all kinds of war material which fell into the hands of the American troops.

One of the principal exhibits and one which will undoubtedly prove the greatest attraction of all is one of the new "whippet" tanks, which the United States was ready to turn out in great numbers at the time the armistice was signed.

The train is accompanied by a detachment of soldiers who have returned from the battle front of France.

The whippet tanks are of the Renault type which helped drive back the Germans in confusion.

## COMMUNITY HOUSE PROPOSITION LOSES BY OVERWHELMING VOTE

### JAMES H. DUFFY DEFEATS JOHN E. CONRAD 330 TO 161

Mayor Hastings Received 669 Votes Which Was 86 More Than Any Other Candidate. Commissioners Elected Are Fritz Bahr, Frank L. Cheney, E. G. Huber and Ward W. Willits.

In light of the fact that there was no opposition Highland Park registered a heavy vote at the city election last Tuesday. The largest number of votes was cast for Mayor Hastings, who received eighty-six more votes than any other candidate. The only contest in the city offices was that of Police Magistrate for which James Duffy received 330 votes against John Conrad 161.

At this election the proposition of a Municipal Coliseum was placed upon the ballot and officially submitted to the people of Highland Park for their vote. The question was whether or not the people favored building such a building, and the vote was either "yes" or "no."

It will be remembered that there had been much discussion previous to the election in regard to building a community house as a memorial for those who lost their lives in the service of their country, and it is just possible that many still wonder why this phase of the question was not also submitted to the people of Highland Park at the regular election. The answer is very simple, namely that under the Coliseum Act the question "for" or "against" is the only question on which the people can legally cast their vote. On this proposition, then, for or against, the people of Highland Park voted "against" 514, and "for" 212—an overwhelming majority being against the acquisition of a community house in this form.

But the need for a community house exists just as much as ever, and the majority of people in this city are well aware of this fact. The vote last Tuesday did not signify that the people of Highland Park were not in favor of a community house, but rather that they did not approve the acquisition of it by the Coliseum Act method. The Municipal Coliseum may be a dead issue, but the community house is still very much alive.

## BIDINGER ELECTED MAYOR OF WAUKEGAN

Strang, Bilharz, Atterbery and McDermott Elected Commissioners Tuesday

Mr. Bidinger, who was Waukegan's first mayor under the commission plan of government, was again elected to office Tuesday by a majority of 348 votes over Fred W. Buck, his only opponent.

With Mr. Bidinger's election the plan to institute the commission manager idea in Waukegan went to a defeat.

At the same time all but one of the city manager candidates met with defeat. The only exception was Walter W. Bilharz, who ran a close second to Mr. Bidinger in the total vote cast. Mr. Bilharz' total vote was 2776; Mr. Bidinger's 2875; while Henry Strang, leader over all, piled up 2959.

### Here Are Commissioners

The commissioners elect are Mr. Strang, 2959 votes; Mr. Bilharz, 2766; Carl Atterbery, 2472; and Peter McDermott, 2445.

Mr. Buck's total vote was 2527. The votes of the commissioner candidates who lost out were Julius V. Balz, 2302; E. V. Orvis, only one of the present officials to enter the race, 2274; William F. Wandel, 2226; and S. A. Hawthorne, 2035. Mr. Balz ran fifth, Orvis sixth, Wandel seventh and Hawthorne eighth.

### Victory Celebrated

Just as soon as the victory of J. F. Bidinger in his race for mayor was assured, bonfires flared up in dozens of places and the blare of bands sounded his triumph to the city at large.

The space in front of the Bidinger headquarters on Washington street, and the rooms within the building, were a scene of wild rejoicing. Red fire burned, there were cheers, there were speeches and impromptu parades were formed which marched in triumph throughout the business district.

## B. H. KRESS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF DEERFIELD

Beckley, Haunschild and Segert Are Elected Village Trustees. Ender For Police Magistrate

B. H. Kress was elected president of the village of Deerfield at Tuesday's election by a vote of 165 against F. H. Meyer, who received 87. Theo. J. Knaak was re-elected village clerk without opposition.

Eugene Ender was elected police magistrate by a vote of 92 against C. W. Pettis 34.

John J. Beckley, Herman Haunschild and Edward F. Segert were elected village trustees. The retiring president was William Reay and the retiring trustees were J. A. Reichert, Jr., Wm. Karch and Frank Hempstead. None of the retiring officials were candidates for re-election. The total vote cast is as follows:

For president, B. H. Kress, 92 men and 76 women; F. H. Meyer, 40 men, and 47 women; for village clerk, T. J. Knaak, 195 men and 98 women; for police magistrate, Eugene Ender, 92 and C. W. Pettis, 34; for trustees, John J. Beckley, 74 men and 60 women; Herman Haunschild, 80 men and 61 women; Edward F. Segert, 115 men and 90 women; Milton Frantz, 54 men and 52 women; Fred Stryker, 51 men and 52 women.
