WAR CAMP COMMUNITY SERVICE

A prize dancing contest and the old time and old fashioned Virginia Reel, proved to be the star attraction at last Saturday night's dance at the high school.

The prize dancing contest has been advertised and previously arranged for and it is said that some of the girls had "stepped off" some of the new figures during the previous week in practice and as a result some very satisfactory performances were obtained.

The competition event was announced for 9:30, and promptly on the minute the orchestra played a one-step and the judges consisting of Mesdames Drake and Merritt, and Mr. Nathan Corwin stationed themselves in the gallery as judges of the event. It was announced that the trials would consist of a three-minute one-step, a three minute fox-trot and a three minute waltz. Twenty-four couples in all participated, and Miss McNeill and escort were awarded the prize. Primarily the dance was given for the purpose of indicating what is proper form in the matter of dancing.

Most everything at the War Camp Community Dances receive their inspiration from the occasion itself, and very seldom is any elaborate program arranged for in advance, and following this procedure a Virginia Reel was arranged for and executed in due form.

The suggestion was brought about by several young men who evidently knew something about Virginia Reel, but did not know how to dance the modern dances. The result was the Committee got together five different sets or groupings: one of the Committee men had agreed to call off the different figures and in good faith attempted to carry out his contract, but it was soon discovered that very few knew how to dance the Virginia Reel, and the Committee in charge were required to take physical charge of each grouping or set. After the dancers got on to the hang of the thing, it looked like as if Pandemonium was let loose. Forward and back was shouted to the dancers—head lady and foot gentlemen, backward and forward—opposite the same—head lady an foot gent, right hand swing in the center, dosie do cast off and counter march, rang out from the five Committee-men in charge and the Khaki and Blue did certainly shuffle their feet some until the old gymnasium seemed to vibrate in unison with the dancers. Up in one corner of the room Miss Melba DuBrock enlivened her set by setting a lively pace and many of the dancers who did not take part, secured places of vantage up in the gallery and watched this set and the others go through the evolutions of this old-time and most blessed of all old dances while the orchestra pounded out the Money Musk, the Irish Washer Woman and Old Dan Tucker. As one sailor said at the conclusion of the dance it certainly was a "corker."

It was announced last Saturday evening that on May 3rd a May Festival event would be arranged, occupying the entire afternoon and evening of the day at the High School.

A Maypole is to be placed on the Campus and sixteen girls and possibly some of the boys of the High School under the guidance of Miss Reed will execute the Maypole Dance.

A series of athletic events, including a 50 yard dash, relay race, tug of war, and riding the raft contest will be given on the campus under the supervision of Mr. Rothacker, assisted by Mr. Harris of the Army and Navy Center. These contests will be opened to all men in uniform.

At the conclusion of the afternoon events the men in uniform will be invited to supper at the homes of some of our citizens and returning at eight o'clock to the boys' gym, the regular Saturday evening dance will be given. A request has been made for a jackie orchestra and a band from the army, and the citizens of Highland Park may look forward to a pleasant holiday on May third, let everybody pray for good weather. However, if the prayers are not answered favorably the entire program will be given in the Gymnasium.

The public will be interested to know something of what we are doing for the Fort Sheridan men on Saturday evenings. That they have a religious nature as well as a physical and social nature; and that those who would serve these men most advantageously to themselves, to the communities and the world in these critical times, will see to it that their service shall serve not a fraction of their natures but the whole man.

This is what we started out to do. We have succeeded well in strengthening the tie that binds these fine young men to home, mother and God. Saturday evening marked the climax of our efforts. Notwithstanding the rain, a large number of soldiers were present. Our opening religious service was very impressive. Miss Orva Stein of Elm Place School gave her second program of readings. Miss Stein followed two of the strongest performers we have had this year. On Mar. 29th Miss Wier of Chicago, a little fifteen year old Scotch girl, a wonderful interpreter in the Scotch dialect, was here. On April 5th, Miss Martin, also of Chicago, and a reader of unusual ability gave the program. But, though her second appearance, the almost irrepressible applause easily ranked Miss Stein second to none in the ability to hold the attention, to please and to instruct her audience.

Believing that special recognition should be given for meritorious conduct in times of peace as in war, Sergeant F. P. Merrill, commanding C. Barracks 42, was presented with an E. L. watch charm. Sergeant Merrill has been most loyal in his support of our work, a fine Christian gentleman, and highly honored both by the men of his company and by his superior officers. We shall miss him greatly but we are thankful that through his loyalty others are ready to take his place. The games and refreshments followed by a number of war songs ending with "God Be With You" closed the most ideal evening of the long series. Two of the regular army chaplains were present and declared themselves delighted with the work we are doing.
