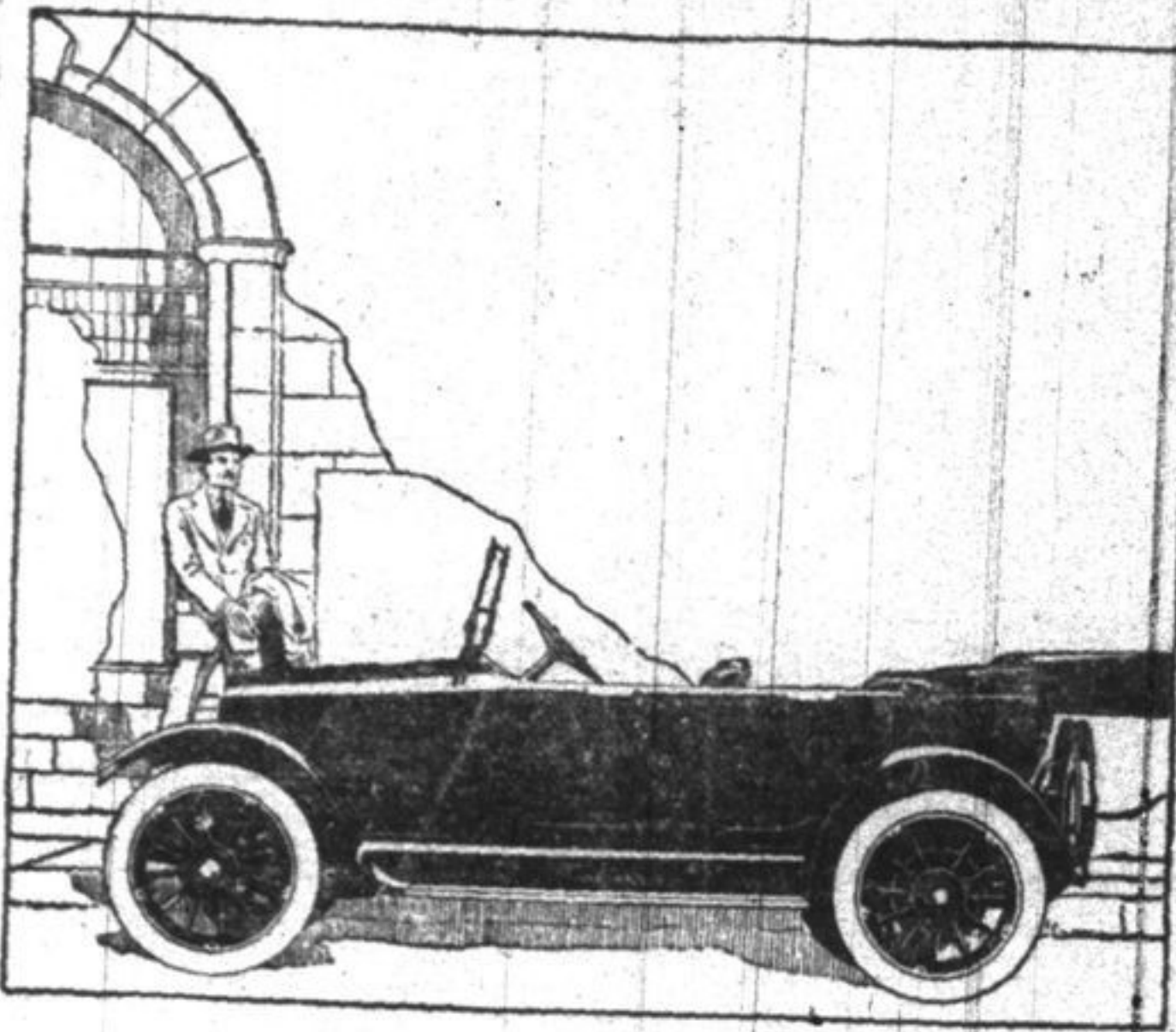

The Wednesday 7:30 p. m. Service. It may be that the mid-week service is taboo in some churches and localities. It may be that some who read this know of instances where even the church "pillars" declared by their utter silence and continued absence in "totality," that the mid-week service is a relic of a by-gone age; that the law of evolution has done (?) so much for them, has evolved (?) them into such superior moral and spiritual beings that they, remembering (perhaps with a shudder), the low depths from which they have so gradually and painfully ascended, can look with an amazing complacency upon those whose misfortune it is to need the ministrations of this institution which they have so long since outgrown. Of course, it is true that these people of such unusual attainments are just a little sensitive when too close an application of the teachings of Jesus is made to their business methods; their other social relations; their moral and spiritual life. Groups are to be found here and there, whose knowledge of all these relations is so intimate and thorough that they demand that the church and her minister should keep silent on these questions; that Church is too pure, her hands too clean to be contaminated with indulgence in such worldly affairs. Sometimes if the minister is really a fool; if he cannot grasp the force of the "thou shalt not," that stronger expression "thou shalt not" is used. And if this fails to soak into his mentality he is unceremoniously ousted from the congregation. Certainly there are other methods used, by far more gentle but wonderfully effective in the majority of cases. A fine gold muzzle is bought and presented to the minister. Now many men cannot bear the sight of too much gold, and since ministers are mere men, of course, they are not to be blamed for wearing the gold ornament even if it does make a "figure-head" of him. So it goes. Too much stress must not be placed upon such outgrown institutions as the mid-week service and many other matters equally antiquated.

But really our Wednesday service is growing in popularity. Old-fashioned as it may appear, they are really filling a need. Last week we reached our largest number and had our best service to date. Of course, it was really human as well as di-
