### SCHOOL TAX LEVY WINS IN WAUKEGAN

In the special school election held Saturday afternoon at the Central school, Waukegan, the proposition of authorizing the levying of not more than a three per cent tax upon all taxable property in the Waukegan school district won by a vote of 76 to 3.

The city council will make the levy in July, but the money will not be available until the taxes are collected next year. The additional revenue will go to paying the increased salaries of teachers.

School directors all over the state have been compelled to give teachers increased salaries in order to keep them, in some cases the raise amounting to 20 per cent. Good teachers are scarce and in order to keep them the school board is compelled to meet the salaries they can command in other lines.
