

MARGARET HELEN KEAGLE PASSES AWAY SATURDAY

Funeral Services Held Early Monday Morning from Residence. Interment Near Rockford

Margaret Helen Keagle, daughter Rev. Joseph and Henry Keagle 25 South Green Bay road, was born Stockton, Jo Daviess county, Ill., July 6, 1894, and died in Highland Park, Ill., June 28, 1919, aged eight days less than 25 years. She was educated in the schools of several cities where the exegences of the itinerant preacher called the family from time to time, graduating from the high school of Freeport, Ill., in 1912. She taught in the rural schools for two years, and then entered the Presbyterian Hospital Training School for Nurses at Chicago, Ill., where she completed the course, graduating in September, 1918. 


