The Columbus Exposition
It was our privilege to visit the World Exposition of Methodist Missionary Achievement at Columbus, O., Monday and Tuesday of last week. The wonder and magnitude of the exposition pass beyond human expression. Tens of thousands of visitors were seen on the grounds every day. The pageant "The Wayfarer" is pronounced by critics as the greatest masterpiece in history. It was utterly impossible for the thousands who wanted to see it to gain admittance. The play is scheduled to be shown at the Metropolitan Theatre, New York.

A visit to the Ohio State Fair grounds was equal to a trip around the world. We passed from America to Mexico, Central America, South America, the islands of the Pacific, Japan, China, India, Malaya, Europe, Africa, Australia and Hawaii. Each of these countries were represented by exhibits and natives who gave a demonstration of the conditions preceding and following the coming of the missionary. There was the Moslem funeral, the funeral pier, the sacred Ganges with its myriad worshippers, etc., etc. Words can never convey the significance of this centenary of missionary work much less the effect this event will have on the future life of the world. It is sufficient to say that the greatest awakening of all time has come to the laity of the church; that at this time over \$165,000,000 has already been laid on God's altar for the work of world redemption at home and abroad; that not near all of the churches have been heard from; that the most scientific survey of the needs have been made and that Methodism has not only achieved this but that the young life of the church is coming forward to consecrate itself to the task of world redemption.

CATHOLIC MEN TO MEET AT WAUKEGAN

To Make Arrangements for an Active Big Brother Committee in Every Parish

A meeting of all Catholic men in Lake county has been called to take place in the new Knights of Columbus hall at Waukegan August 3, at 2:30 p. m. The purpose of this gathering will be to simulate an interest in the Holy Name Society in Lake county and to make arrangements for an active Big Brother committee in every parish.

Rev. A. J. McGavick, D. D., Spiritual Director of the Archdiocese of Chicago, has decided to call regular meetings in Lake county as it is not convenient for these members to attend the regular meetings at Chicago. Bishop McGavick hopes thus to bring a direct material benefit to the farmers and to the needy boys.

This work will be done thru the efforts of the Big Brothers. Every year there is a large number of boys in the city who desire work on farms and there are also a large number who have no home and rather than put them in an institution the court rules that they be sent to farms. Finding places for these boys will be the work of the Big Brothers. The boys will be benefited by having clean healthy work away from evil influences and the farmers will be benefited by having help, which is so scarce at all times. All the local arrangements for this meeting are under the direction of Rev. Daniel Byrnes.

WAUKEGAN BARBERS ADVANCE THEIR PRICES

The barbers of Waukegan have raised their prices to 25 cents for a shave and 50 cents for a hair cut. The former prices were 20 cents and 40 cents.

Barbers declare they cannot operate without raising prices. Everything in the way of barbers' supplies has raised tremendously during the last few months, they declare.

As an instance, soap they used to get for 27 cents has raised to 65 cents. Everything else has advanced accordingly.

CONCERNING RETURNS ON REVENUE TAX

Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue, Victor N. Trausch, makes the Following Statement

Returns required under the covering the tax on ice cream soft drinks mixed at the fountain any other similar place of business must be filed with the collector of internal revenue on or before the last day of each month, covering the sales made during the preceding month. The time for filing the return for May has been extended to June 26, 1919. No extension has been made for June or subsequent months.

Persons carrying on the business of operating automobiles for hire shall pay \$10.00 for each such automobile having a seating capacity of more than two and not more than seven, and \$20.00 for each automobile having a seating capacity of less than seven.

This return must not be filed later than the 31st day of July, 1919.

ASSESSED VALUATION INCREASED ONE SIXTH

A pamphlet just received by the board of review from Attorney General Brundage states that under a state tax law the assessment valuation to fix the rate of the Lake county tax levy to provide for the payment of property at one-half of full cash value on personal and real will supercede the former rate of one-third. This increases the assessed valuation one-sixth. The new law reduced the rate of taxation, the same amount heretofore being 75 cents per \$100 valuation, to 50 cents. The county treasurer has received a copy of the new rate, and until it is received it will not be known how this will affect the revenue of the county. The new rate will apply to the property turned in by the assessors last spring.
