## LETTER SUPPORTING WEDNESDAY CLOSING

ASKS PUBLIC'S COOPERATION

"Purchasers of this City Should Give Active Expression of Approval," Says Rev. Frank Fitt

Editor Press, Highland Park, Ill.  
Dear Sir:

This week the Business Men's Association inaugurated in Highland Park a policy which should have the support of every public-spirited citizen, namely, the weekly half-holiday on Wednesday afternoons. Previously a half-holiday on Thursday afternoons had been observed only by two classes of stores, the grocery and the meat market. Now all the stores, with a few exceptions, will observe the Wednesday half-holiday.

The essential justice of this new policy is apparent when one considers the number of hours during the week when the majority of our stores are open to the public. Most of our local stores open their doors at eight o'clock in the morning and close at six o'clock at night. On Saturday many of the stores do not close till nine or ten o'clock at night. This makes a week of sixty-four working hours. By closing on Wednesday at noon the working hours will be reduced to fifty eight. Does this seem unreasonable when the railroad men have achieved a week of forty-eight working hours and when many other trades are striking for a week of even less working hours? A lessened weekly working scale will mean increased efficiency in our community. If purchasers will remember that Wednesday afternoon is the half holiday and plan their purchasing accordingly just as much can be bought and sold without inconvenience and with a saving of time for those most entitled to it.

The main obstacle to this new policy on the part of the Business Men's Association is the difficulty of getting full cooperation. If one store, or a group of stores, break away from the common plan for closing on Wednesday afternoons the plan must be given up. All the stores must work the plan together or none can. It is right at this point that the public opinion can express itself most effectively. If the purchasers of Highland Park will give active expression of their approval of this plan it will be a community service of the most genuine usefulness.
