Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered the improvement of the roadway of Kincaid Street from a point twelve (12) feet north of the south line extended of lot one-hundred fourteen (114), South Highland Addition, south to its intersection with St. Johns Avenue, the roadway therein to be nineteen (19) feet in width; St. Johns Avenue from its intersection with the west line of Kincaid Street produced south, southerly to its intersection with Lambert Tree Avenue, the Roadway therein to be twenty-six (26) feet in width Lambert Tree Avenue from St. Johns Avenue, its westerly terminus east to the paved roadway in Sheridan Road, the roadway therein to be twenty-three (23) feet in width; Woodland Avenue from St. Johns Avenue to the east line of Groveland Avenue, the roadway therein to be nineteen (19) feet in width; Oakland Avenue from St. Johns Avenue to the east line of

Groveland Avenue, the Roadway therein to be nineteen (19) feet in width; Ashland Place from Oakland Avenue to Lambert Tree Avenue, the roadway therein to be nineteen (19) feet in width; Briarwood Place from Kincaid Street to its easterly terminus, the roadway therein to be fifteen (15) feet in width, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, by grading, draining, providing an asphaltic concrete paved roadway with a curb edge and otherwise improving; the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said Court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the Sixth day of September A. D. 1919.
