##### We Want No Privileged Class

"We do not want a privileged class created in this country," said a contractor the other day with solemn earnestness. But this man failed to realize that we have had a privileged class in this country for a long time. And he is right. We do not want a privileged class. We want neither an economic dictatorship of capital nor an economic dictatorship of labor. Either one means the rule of Mammon continued—the mastery of things over the life of the spirit.

But all this leads to nothing in the long run, says Mr. Duncan-Clark. Mammon is not to be overthrown by the triumph of one faction of his devotees over another.

##### An Old Saying

"And then comes the familiar injunction—so often quoted, so tragically neglected—'Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you.'"

"Now either that means what it says, or it means nothing. It is either a most definite promise for a society in which man's material needs may be assured beyond all occasion for worry, or it is merely a bit of rhetoric. The church has largely treated it as a bit of rhetoric, to the dishonor of its Master, the destruction of its own power for good, and the tragic suffering of mankind."

"Jesus was not talking of heaven. He was talking of earth. He was talking of meat and bread and groceries; of hats and clothes and shoes; of fuel and shelter, of all that is essential to the physical life of man."

"These things will come without fret, without anxiety, without complete absorption of mind and energy, if you establish the kingdom of God, if you apply His righteousness to human relations." And in such a society man will be free from Mammon and the spirit of man can enter into its full inheritance. There will be joy in toil because fear is eliminated; there can be love of neighbor because envy is banished.

3. Restore the rates for person to person, appointment, messenger and collect, toll and long distance service, which were in effect during the period of government control and were suspended August 1, 1919.
4. Make permanent the present temporary rates for toll and long distance service within the State of Illinois.
