### WORK BEING RUSHED AT "SHORE ACRES" CLUB

New Golf Course Located on Shore of Lake Just South of the Naval Station

Work at Shore Acres Golf Links is progressing rapidly — it is a busy looking "woods" everybody from the water carrier boys to the president is attending to their part of the project.

The man who laid out the National golf course at Southampton, L. I., under Mr. McDonald's supervision, will lay out the Shore Acres course.

By next summer nine holes will be ready for play. Many golf courses have two or three so-called "championship holes." It is proposed to have this new course have eighteen championship holes.

The Club is bounded on the east by the lake, on the north by the Great Lakes Naval Training station, on the west by the Northwestern railway and Milwaukee Electric tracks, and on the south by the estates of Howard Linn and William McCormick Blair, who plan building there in a year or so.

specially difficult positions in the government service.

"I am reminded of a story told by Uncle Joe Cannon, the dean of Illinois Congressmen in Washington, who one day in discussing the war said:

"Do you know why John Philip Sousa has the greatest band in America?"

"No," the friend replied. "Well, every time John Philip Sousa wants a piccolo player, he hires piccolo player."

"Highland Park did not furnish many piccolo players to the government service, but it furnished men qualified equally as well for difficult positions.

"In closing, let us pause for a moment to pay our respect to the worthy service performed for our men overseas by those faithful organizations who looked after the welfare and the entertainment of our men. I call especially to mind the Red Cross, the Camp Recreation Service, the Salvation Army, the Knights of Columbus and the Y. M. C. A. With very little opportunity for winning Distinguished Service Crosses or Congressional Medals, the men and women in these services who went into the conflict, many of them never to return, so that our men might be better fighters and our army be victorious.

"Men, let me repeat—Highland Park is proud of you. We glory in your record. We welcome you home."

Capt. Joseph B. Card responded in a very able speech, on behalf of the Army. Mr. Harry E. Eichler was then heard in a short and telling speech on behalf of the Navy. Mr. Fred Silber, representing the citizens who remained at home and "did their bit" with all their might, was the last speaker on the program, and a very well-chosen representative he was. Carl Booth was there, of course, otherwise there would have been no singing worth mentioning. He has sung the morale of the town up the register many times in the past two years.

All in all, the "Welcome Home" was a success. It will long be remembered as one of the greatest get-together days in the history of Highland Park.

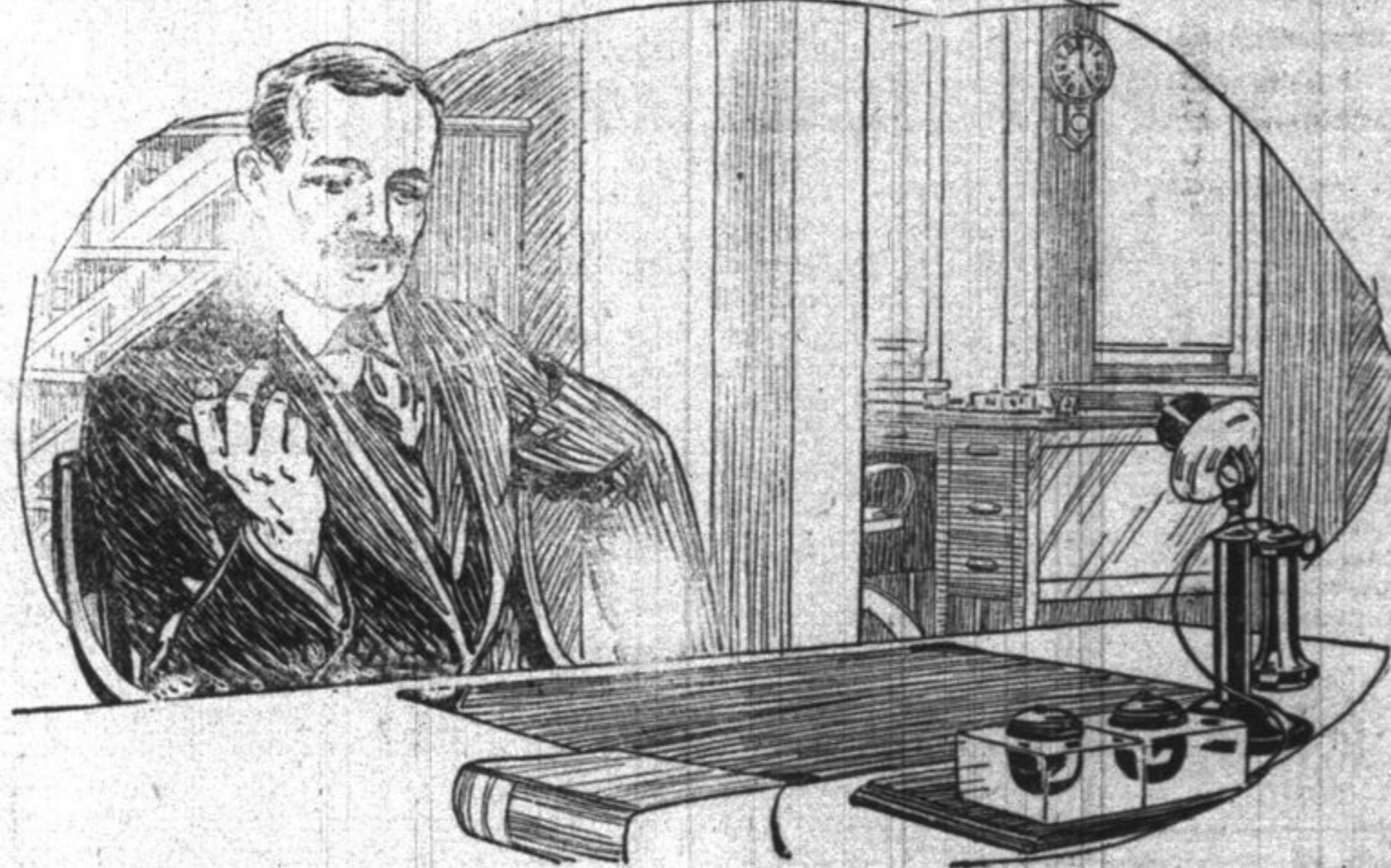
