MAY BE FINAL YEAR FOR LAKE COUNTY FAIR

DEPENDS UPON SUPPORT

Officials Trying to Represent Every Part of the County and Give People Clean Entertainment

The Lake County Fair has been held continuously for 65 years, but at present the financial conditions of the association are such that unless the people of Lake county are sufficiently interested to give the Fair their support by helping to bring out a big attendance there is a prospect that our 1919 Fair will ring down the final curtain and in the future we would have only livestock shows in the county instead of the modern County Fair. The present situation is due to a combination of circumstances and has not been brought about by any particular thing.

The present officers and directors are trying to represent every section of Lake County, playing no favorites, but working as a unit to make the Lake County Fair the very best of its kind in the Chicago district.

A brief resume of the work done by our present board and the plans for our 1919 Fair might be of interest.

Every bill against the Fair Association has been paid. Some of these bills were two years old.

The constitution and rules have been changed so as to place our Fair on the same basis with other modern county fairs.

The premium list has been completely revised, with new features added and antiquated policies discarded.

The premium list has been published and distributed without cost to the association. This was made possible by farmers and other business men of Lake county who carried advertising.

As a special attraction the premiums offered have been increased by the addition of \$1300 given for specials. These specials have been offered for exhibits in every department so as to give exhibitors in all departments.

Some of these specials include:
\$5 to \$25 cash for certain exhibits.
\$25.00 canner for exhibit of canned vegetables by farm woman.
\$25.00 cash for the best exhibit of plain and fancy sewing.

\$10.00 for the highest scoring baby boy under 2 years and the same for a baby girl.
\$25.00 for the best exhibit of vegetables.

\$15.00 for the best poultry display of nine birds.

Cash and valuable cups will be offered in all the different livestock departments, or classes.

A \$25.00 wool flag will be given the township that has the largest number of automobiles in a parade at the grounds, Saturday, September 6th at 1 o'clock. Libertyville township does not compete. See the Secretary for details.

These are only a few of the valuable premiums worth competing for. A complete list will be found in the premium book which may be secured by writing the secretary.

Boys' and Girls' Stock Judging Contest

This is a new feature that has been added this year. These contests will be held at 10 a. m. September 4th and 5th on the grounds. Only boys and girls between the ages of 14 to 18 can compete. Dairy cattle and hogs will be judged. Complete instructions will be given before the contest begins. The premiums will be pure bred calves and pigs as well as free trips to the National Dairy Show and the International Livestock show.

Larry Brown will give an exhibition flying features daily so that everyone may see an aeroplane at close range and many of the apparently impossible and amazing things they are capable of.

The racing programs will be up to the standard or better than usual.

A dancing platform will be erected able price and under proper supervision.

The Association is trying to get a war souvenir display, showing captured equipment as well as equipment used by our own men.

The recent rains have been of wonderful value so that our corn and on the grounds so that whoever desires may have an opportunity to "shake their festive toe" at a reason- other fall crops should be more than up to standard for this time of the year. Corn prospects could not be much better.

Many entries have already been made in the livestock departments so we can safely predict displays here of over half a million dollars. In the poultry department plans have been changed to appeal more to the local breeders, many of whom have already signified their willingness to help make the poultry show a feature.

The judges will be experts in their lines, and every exhibitor will be given fair treatment and extended every possible courtesy by the management.

The management is trying to make this a county fair for the people of Lake county who desire clean entertainment as well as instruction. But a successful fair can be built up and maintained only through efficient management combined with the loyal support of local people from all parts of the county.

Public Notice Relative to the Eradication of the Common Barberries from the State

To Whom it May Concern:
It has been determined by the Department of Agriculture that the tall growing European Barberries, *Barberis vulgaris*, and all its horticultural varieties including the purple-leaf barberry, *Barberis vulgaris* var. *purpurea*, are a nuisance within the meaning of Section 15 of the Plant

This Program will be found in this position every week

Inspection Act of 1917 as amended in 1919 and that the same should be eradicated from the state for the following reasons:

1. They are not essential to the welfare of the people of the state.

2. They serve as almost the exclusive host plants for a stage of the Black Stem Rust, *Puccinia graminis*, which intervenes between the normal hibernating stage of rust and the later stage which infects wheat and other small grains and grasses, thus serving to maintain the presence and promote the destructive abundance of the rust, and

3. Said disease, *Puccinia graminis*, is very destructive to wheat and other small grains and grasses;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Charles Adkins, Director of Agriculture, by authority invested in me by Section 16 of the Plant Inspection Act of 1917 as amended in 1919, and in accordance with the provision of said act, do hereby give public notice that the tall-growing European barberries, *Barberis vulgaris*, and all its horticultural varieties including the purple-leaf barberry, *Barberis vulgaris* var. *purpurea*, are a nuisance within the meaning of Section 15 of the Plant

var. *purpurea*, characterized by erect growing habits, three branched thorns, leaves with tooth-edges, and berries growing in clusters, are a nuisance and must be eradicated from the State for the protection of wheat and other small grains and grasses.

All firms, corporations, private individuals and other persons owning or controlling lands or places in this State, and all public authorities having jurisdiction over streets, highways, parks and other public places, are hereby directed to free and to keep the same free from the above described species and varieties of barberry.

This notice does not apply to the Japanese barberry, *Barberis thunbergii* or Mahonias, unless actually infected by the said rust.

This notice becomes effective August 30, 1919.
Done at Springfield, Ill., this 12th day of August, 1919.
