

Putting the Treaty Fight Up to the People



A new referee is now judging the peace treaty fight. It is "yes common people," the fight having been brought out into the open by President Wilson and countered by the treaty opponents. Putting the treaty up to the people, in a swing around the states, the president is being met half way by Republican leaders, Senators Borah and Hiram Johnson. MAKING A SUBURB FAMOUS

There are, of course, several ways of doing so. The one, that is the easiest, but also the most pleasant and profitable, is the correct planting of its "Home Grounds, Parks, etc."

Portland is famed for its wonderful roses, as is Lyon, France and Luxemburg, Kansas City and Minneapolis excel through systematic street planting, fine natural parks, lakes and City Foresters advise people what and when to plant.

The art of landscape gardening is truly a fascinating one, one which with a comparatively small outlay of money brings the owner sure and pleasurable returns, be it by enhancement of the premises or in the natural increase in property value.

Before Baron Hausman remodeled Paris; this now lovely town did not have the fame, nor was it the art center of Europe. Living under the second Empire, this famous lawyer and musician became a landscape architect and made all the world ring with his fame. Napoleon and the City Council of Paris voted him five billion francs to create parks and boulevards, etc., put statues where they belonged, etc. While this may not seem to the point, it is, in my opinion, essentially so.

Right now the Park Addition should become a fact and the often called Lovely Skokie, (I term it Slough), can really be made some wonderful thing. Being fed by numerous springs, etc., it may be channeled and a continuous series of lakes, likely with a few dotted islands in some of them, should stretch from Lake Forest to Wilmette. At present this mosquito breeder may be all right during the summer if it were not for this pestilence. If oil is used, it would likely kill the plant growth, and this is now its only real attraction. So I would advise either improving the Skokie in the above mentioned way or draining it altogether.

Now let us see what else may be done to make a large and famed town out of already pretty Highland Park.

Since system seems to be the keynote to all success, I claim the same to be true in my art. Where new streets are to be laid out the plan of one variety of trees for each street could be followed and an ordinance to the effect passed. Each park should be entirely different from the

The gardens of our wealthier towns-people have been mostly laid out by landscape architects and are, therefore, often very lovely. But the man of smaller means and smaller grounds may also have a very fine garden if planted correctly. This does not necessarily mean a great outlay of money, since we have, right here in town, several firms famous for their fine evergreens, perennials, etc.

In my next article I will try to tell you more about how to create an ideal garden—how to have good foundation planting and what shrubs to use.

I hope sincerely that Highland Park will one day be known as the first suburban town in the whole wide world. If I can help doing so I shall not have lived for nothing.
