QUEEN OF THE WEST RESORT FINED \$140

Ned Bates, proprietor of the Queen of the West hotel and resort at Petite Lake, arrested a few weeks ago on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor and operating slot machines, yesterday was fined \$100 and \$40 costs, one count, the other being dropped upon his decision to plead guilty. The case was tried before Justice Joseph L. Bishop of Zion. Bates was not represented by an attorney. States Attorney James G. Welch prosecuted. A dramatic feature was enacted when, after imposing the fine, Mrs. Bates turned to the Rev. Thomas R. Quayle, of Highland Park, superintendent of the Lake County Law and Order league, and responsible for the raid, shook hands with him and wished him success in his work. The slot machines were not destroyed as they are to be kept as evidence in another case.

COUNTY TREAS. TURNS OVER STATE FUNDS

Roy W. Bracher, county treasurer, has returned from Springfield where he made final settlement for tax funds belonging to the state. He turned over about \$42,000. During the year Mr. Bracher turned over to the state \$186,608.42. All but the \$42,000 was turned over last spring. Mr. Bracher will make an attempt to hold school fund money until fall hereafter, in which case the county would get the benefit of the interest money instead of the state. This fund is returned to the county superintendent of schools anyway, and for that reason Mr. Bracher believes he can hold it and turn it over to the county superintendent as needed. The fund last year was about \$33,000 and the interest on this for three or four months would be quite a nest-egg for Lake county.

PLAN TO PAVE ROAD THROUGH ZION CITY

Zion City has offered to pay \$90,000 of the \$150,000 necessary to build a hard road through that city. The formal offer was placed before state and Lake county officials at a meeting held Tuesday afternoon in Chicago.

The plan provides for a 50 foot street for the 1 1/2 miles running thru Zion. If completed it would be the last lap between Chicago and Milwaukee.

State officials are said to believe that the offer of Zion is a very fair one and it looks as if it meant that the Zion stretch will be cared for. A large part of the property abutting is vacant and that is why the state doesn't expect Zion can swing the whole improvement without outside aid.

OPPONENTS IN BITTER CONTROVERSY



The renomination of John Skilton Williams, of Virginia, to be Comptroller of the Currency for another five years after a Democratic Senate refused to confirm his nomination at the last session forecasts a continuance of the fight against Williams' confirmation. Representative McFadden, of Pennsylvania, a member of the Banking and Currency Committee, is leading the House opposition to continuance of the Comptroller's office. He is author of a bill to vest the function of the office in the Federal Reserve Board, asserting that Williams' conduct in office has demonstrated the danger to the country which lies in the abuse of large powers granted to individual Federal officers when those officers are inclined to be autocratic. Indications are the Senate will again refuse to confirm Williams.
