SUPERVISORS APPROVE COUNTY ROAD PROGRAM

Road Between Highland Park and Deerfield Is Included in This Plan

The supervisors at their meeting last week voted to proceed with the newly mapped program of the road committee for constructing a system of roads in Lake county to cost upwards of \$750,000. The Committee's program includes roads as fol-

Highland Park to Deerfield; Highwood to Telegraph Road; Rockland road from Federal Aid road to Ivanhoe; Barrington to two miles north; Wauconda to Volo; Hainesville to Round Lake; Lake Villa to Antioch; one mile in Zion City; Green Bay road from Washington street, Waukegan to road leading west to Wadsworth from Green Bay road.

Chairman Bairstow announced at the meeting that the state would not give the county any state aid money for the next two years; it has had none for a year. The reason is that the state aid money is now being used to meet the federal aid money on federal aid roads.

Mr. Bairstow says that state officials have told him that of 1000 miles of state roads planed this year but 250 miles have been finished, due to general conditions and due to the desire to take advantage of the sixty million dollar bond issue


