Friday afternoon, when the car in which they were riding overturned at the curve in Sheridan Road near North gate, Fort Sheridan.

The young ladies, who are employed in the quartermaster's office at the fort, were returning from a hurried trip to Lake Forest, in a new Studebaker car, driven by Miss Stoke, and rounded the curve too rapidly. The car turned turtle pinning them under. The top had to be cut away to release them.

Miss Wilhelm was rushed to the fort hospital, where she is now recovering from her injuries and the shock caused by the accident. She will be brought to her home in Highland Park in a few days.

SUPERVISORS APPROVE COUNTY ROAD PROGRAM

Road Between Highland Park and Deerfield Is Included in This Plan

The supervisors at their meeting last week voted to proceed with the newly mapped program of the road committee for constructing a system of roads in Lake county to cost upwards of \$750,000. The committee's program includes roads as follows:

Highland Park to Deerfield; Greenwood to Telegraph Road; Rockland road from Federal Aid road to Ivanhoe; Barrington to two miles north; Wauconda to Volo; Hainesville to Round Lake; Lake Villa to Antioch; one mile in Zion City; Green Bay road from Washington street, Waukegan to road leading west to Wadsworth from Green Bay road.

Chairman Baird announced at the meeting that the state would not give the county any state aid money for the next two years; it had had none for a year. The reason is that the state aid money is now being used to meet the federal aid money on federal aid roads.

Mr. Baird says that state officials have told him that of 1,000 miles of state roads planned this year but 250 miles have been finished, due to general conditions and due to the desire to take advantage of the sixty million dollar bond issue funds.

SEVERAL REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS REPORTED

The forty acres belonging to the John Garrity estate have been sold to J. Irving Jordan of Highland Park, the sale being made through the Henry K. Coale and Son agency. Mr. Jordan is erecting a fine home on the property, which is at the southeast corner of Ridge Road and Halfday Road, opposite the John T. Alexander country place.

The sales of the H. F. Salyards home at Ravinia to Hattie Nelson and the Brace house on Forest avenue to R. L. Sandwick are also reported.

Harry L. Canmann has purchased the Balch property on the east side of Kincaid street, south of Roger Williams avenue, the consideration being \$14,000. Arthur F. Byfield and wife bought the Jordan property on the east side of Linden avenue, north of Beach street, for \$11,000 subject to encumbrance.

ESCAPE INJURY WHEN TWO AUTOS COLLIDE

Several persons narrowly escaped serious injury about 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning, when two cars collided at the corner of Vine avenue and Green Bay Road. A. L. Moore, driving north on Green Bay, smashed into a car that was coming east on Vine avenue, and his car was badly smashed. No one was injured in the accident. The cars were towed to a garage for repairs.

Mr. Moore was expecting a traffic officer to be on duty at the corner, and sensed no danger. Garage men state that this is only one of a series of about twenty minor accidents that have occurred at this corner during the present summer.

HOSTESS HOUSE WILL BE OPENED WEDNESDAY

The fine new building to be used as a Hostess house at Fort Sheridan has been completed and will formally open next Wednesday afternoon.

WAUKEGAN TO HAVE ARTIFICIAL ICE PLANT

Waukegan will have an ice manufacturing plant of its own and in operation by January 1, 1920, it was announced Monday, and five well known Waukegan men are behind the project. The builders of the new plant are Al Brummund, Fred W. Buck, H. C. Burnett, Charles A. Wornack and D. T. Webb. The factory will be located at Edison Court. Construction will be started the first of next week. The original unit will be capable of manufacturing 50 tons of ice a day and the factory will be so constructed that an additional unit can be built. Within a year after the completion of the original unit it is believed the business will have reached a stage where an additional unit will be required, capable of producing a total of 100 tons a day.
