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HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

The Evening High School continues to grow. At the end of the first week 216 students had registered. Classes in typewriting are now full, and students are being turned away. There is a plan on foot to mix some social life with the studies. Every two weeks one of the classes will entertain the others for one hour at the close of the session from nine to ten o'clock. These hours will be enjoyed in the girls' gymnasium. A typewriting class will be responsible for the first social hour.

Mr. Sandwick visited at the University of Illinois on Saturday and laid before the department of education and Philosophy his plan for curriculum reconstruction through analysis of current needs in economic, political and social life. The plan involves cooperative study and analysis of the present day situation by leaders in these different fields of activity. It puts the schools on the side of progress toward securing more happy and efficient workers, more happy and efficient citizens of nation, state, and community, and more happy and effective members of home, church, and local society. The plan received the unanimous endorsement of the departments consulted. Much attention will be given to the subject of curriculum reconstruction at the November conference of High School teachers.

Mr. Frank Zipoy teacher of commercial branches led one of the three American companies that took the last serious stronghold at Ballicourt Heights and pierced the German line. Mr. Zipoy spoke to the students on Monday morning of the unhappy effect of gambling among the soldiers of his company, and advised the boys to throw their influence against betting in all its forms.

Professor Salvatore Tomasso played the mandolin in general assembly on Wednesday last, most delightfully. It was to most of his audience a revelation. Few had realized before the charm and power of this instrument. Professor Tomasso has a group of students taking up the study of mandolin music. Under his direction the mandolin club will again become a source of interest and pleasure in the school. Following the music Mr. Glick gave a short talk on the industrial situation in his series on current events. The talk was most timely and interesting.

Students are still registering. There are 493 now in attendance with a prospect of 500 before the year goes much farther, and possibly 540 with the registrations for the second semester. The moving pictures for tomorrow are entitled "The Benefactor," and they portray the life of Thomas Edison.

ELM PLACE SCHOOL

The total enrollment for Elm Place for the month of September was seven hundred seven pupils, the largest in its history. Of these three hundred seventy were boys and three hundred thirty seven were girls. It is an interesting fact that the record at Elm Place for at least twenty years has shown a majority of boy pupils over girl pupils. This year there are at present only thirty three more boys than girls but the boys consider that a good showing anyway.

This year eight pupils of the 8A class are also enrolled in the high school for two studies. They recite at the high school until eleven and report at Elm Place for the remainder of the day. These are pupils that had progressed somewhat in advance of their class and were granted high school privileges because of that fact.

The annual autumn sale of bulbs is being held this week. These are choice bulbs sold to children only. Some are purchased as the property of individual classes to be stored in the cold frames for planting as well as forcing. The pupils are also collecting choice geraniums for cutting. Persons having fine geraniums that they do not intend to save will please note that Elm Place school would like very much to have these plants for cuttings. Only geranium plants can be used to good advantage.

The Elm Place football eleven under Mr. Marshall's coaching has successfully defeated Lake Forest and Lake Bluff elevens and held the Glencoe boys to a tie score. Allen Bench is captain of the eleven.

Seven of the Elm Place staff were guests of Miss Alice Louise Davis at St. Charles on Saturday. A trip on Fox River and a picnic lunch in the woods were features of the day. Miss Davis teaches mathematics and commercial geography in the junior high school at St. Charles this year.
