PLAN KINDERGARTEN TO HELP MOTHERS

An afternoon kindergarten for children between three and six years of age is being established in Wilmette for the convenience of mothers who wish to shop in the city or go to the Woman's Club, attend social duties, or otherwise in the afternoons. It will be financed by the subscriptions of the mothers who wish to make use of it. These mothers will be required to pay a nominal sum each week for the privilege of leaving their children in this kindergarten as many afternoons a week as they wish.

This kindergarten is not directly under the public schools although it uses one of the public school kindergartens and equipment of the regular public school morning kindergarten. An excellent teacher, well trained and experienced, has been secured to carry on this work.

sionists. Our country side should not be left unprotected. We can rely only upon officials appointed to do this work.

It would be easy in a survey of Lake County to make a brave list of areas that we should all own in common. A number of proposed areas have already been given considerable publicity. We would all probably agree in asking for a reservation embracing a portion of our wonderful frontage on Lake Michigan. We would all want some DesPlaines River scenery, some of our picturesque marshes dotted with wooded islands, and so the list would grow. It is to be hoped that we all can agree to make our beginning now. We must try to forestall danger of selling scenery for pig lots or factory sites.

We must have pig lots and factories but even they are exceedingly poor investments if to secure them means the sacrifice of natural advantages. The most practical thing we can do is to make public investments in that in which the public's interest might at any time be sacrificed at the whim or need of private ownership.
