SO SAYS WAUKEGAN

In last week's issue of The Press we put ourselves on record as favoring the Forest Preserve movement, for which we were taken sternly task by the Waukegan Sun. In an editorial comment that paper says: "Now don't blame The Press. It is published in a spot, Highland Park, where aesthetic ideas flock skyward and permeate the

aristocratic atmosphere to such a point that it is hard for the ordinary citizen to breathe, not being used to such haughty airs." It is far from the policy of this paper to resort to "personalities" in an argument, yet seeing we did not make the first attack, it behooves us to defend our personality, such as it is. We agree heartily that there is more room for "aesthetic ideas" in an atmosphere which is not laden with factory smoke, and scenery which is not spiked with the ugly shafts of chimneys. It is in accord with the crass utilitarianism of a factory town to cut down the forests for the mere expediency of a dollar in the hand which is worth twenty in the woods. What use to argue about the barren condition of the country and its lack of beauty in fifty years from now? Let

the future generations take care of themselves, is their motto of exped-The tax for the Forest Preserve is almost negligible, being two-thirds of mill on the dollar, which would amount to one dollar on a five thousand dollar property. The Sun also accuses Highland Park of having more money than it knows what to do with, a fact which we wish were true, but which, if granted, would make the tax fall more heavily on us.

Waukegan would prefer to burn or eat the forests rather than preserve them at a nominal cost per year. If they would spend one half the energy on rooting out politics which they fain would use to root out trees, it would not be necessary to tax the balance of Lake County for the preservation

CITY HALL AS MEDIATOR

The prempt action of the present City Hall administration in securing a large shipment of canned grocery goods for distribution in Highland Park is a thing which makes a strong appeal to the people of this community. This opportunity to buy supplies for the winter at half price or even less came at a time when every housewife was at her wit's end to know what to do to ameliorate prices and at the same time provide nourishing food for her family. The Great Lakes Naval Station has a supply of this goods on hand which it is giving out in limited quantities to the neighboring towns. The demand at the Station, however, is just as great as it is here in Highland Park where people had congregated for half a block thirty minutes before the time appointed for the sale to begin. We have our City Hall official to thank for his ingenuity in securing this goods for Highland

This is a significant step on the part of our city administration to take action in some effort to alleviate the vicious price regime of which we are all the victims. It required the entire City Hall force to take care of the orders and handle the goods last Saturday, but it was done, and everything was sold. The long continuous line of people with baskets who waited for a good part of an hour for their turn, only proves the urgency for action on the part of the city government. It was a timely act and one of great significance in the civic needs of this community.
