BUYS CEMETERY LOT AND ERECTS MONUMENT

Of late years it has been a growing custom of people to buy their cemetery lots, erect monuments and sometimes prepare the vault for the reception of their bodies.

One of the latest cases in Waukegan where this has been done is that of Samuel Schwartz, well known in Lake County, who, it seems, has made all preparations for the disposal of his mortal remains, when that time comes, and Mr. Schwartz looks at it in a very philosophical manner, assuming the stand that he knows he is going to die and that he is going to have everything arranged when that time comes, so it will be easier for his family and friends.

It develops that Mr. Schwartz some time ago purchased a large lot in the Jewish Roumania cemetery, Chicago. The tract contains fourteen burial lots, and Mr. Schwartz has already had erected on the property a monument, which cost \$1,500. On this appears the name of Schwartz.

Further he has contributed \$500 toward a chapel being erected there, his contribution to be used for furniture. In all he has spent \$2,500 in buying, grading and repairing the burial tract.
