A True Story Here is a story which may remind some readers of a time when people called Christians worshipped a God who was more than an IT or SOMETHING less than, inferior to the worshipper. A time when Christ was a risen, living, transforming, life-giving Person; not merely a great good man, the greatest ethical teacher, an idealist, a dreamer.

The story has its beginning and setting last Wednesday evening at the Grace M. E. church on the corner of North avenue and Lauretta place. It happened thus:

At the close of the evening Bible conference with its accompanying prayer, personal talks and dismissal, a young man, a soldier, came to the platform to speak to the minister. This dialogue ensued: "Mr. Dick, I have a good Christian mother at home. She is a praying mother and has been praying for me ever since I have been in the service. She is praying for me NOW. I was a good Christian young man when I entered the army. But when I got away from home and especially after I went to France, I did many things I should not have done. I smoked cigarettes, shot craps, engaged in other forms of gambling, drank wine and whiskey and did other things I should not have done. I expect to get my discharge before long and I feel that I must go back to mother as nearly as I was when I left her as it is possible for me to do. I want to get back to God." I replied, "Your MOTHER'S GOD and your HEAVENLY FATHER has been waiting for you to do this thing. Like the good FATHER HE is, He rejoices at your return and the angels rejoice. Do you not think we should ask these people to kneel here for a quiet talk with God?" "Yes" said he. "Let us pray." We knelt there for a talk with FATHER. He prayed aloud and quicker than thought came the answer and assurance that it was all right. The prodigal had received the pardon he sought. He arose from that place with a new light in his eyes and the old but glad peace in his heart.

Then last Sunday evening at the close of our service the usual invitation was extended for any who desired to get back to the FATHER'S house to come forward. Two young men came to the front. The one had been baptized in infancy but had never openly avowed his discipleship to JESUS CHRIST. The other young man had never received any of the sacraments of the church. Both young men were made happy. The one in the thought that he had not only given himself in living sacrifice to the service of Christ and His humanity, but also that he had led his comrade in uniform to give his life in a similar service. After the service closed, a young man standing at the right of the altar with big tears in his eyes, was pointed out to the minister. After a conversation of nearly thirty minutes this young man also bowed the knee in sincere penitence and arose in the positive assurance that he had been forgiven and adopted into the body of true believers. But not until the whole field of Christian service had been pointed out and he had declared his willingness to enter any one of these fields of Kingdom Building. When that comital had been made and this young life dedicated to the greatest work of all, "Individual Work for Individuals," it was perfectly simple for him to secure the release and assurance he desired.

We acknowledge the great help rendered through the money given for the year work in this church. On the strength of this we were able to take thirty-five soldiers to the great Chicago Northern District Rally at Irving Park M. E. church, Chicago, last Saturday.
