AN ORCHESTRA WITH FIVE LEGS AT FORT

With only one leg apiece, five wounded men at Fort Sheridan are forming an orchestra led by "Citation Jack," who has a peg leg and four medals—the Victoria Cross, two Croix de guerre, and a distinguished service cross. Although several of them could play by ear, none of these men had any lessons before they registered in the music class of the Fort Sheridan educational department.

Citation Jack, or as he is called in his enlistment papers, Ray Kennedy, 119th Infantry, received his Victoria cross when he volunteered to go on a day light tour of no man's land, accompanied by a lieutenant.

The two succeeded in discovering a number of machine guns, two of which they destroyed then, the others being destroyed by bombardment the following night.

A croix de guerre with the palm, the highest French citation, was awarded when Kennedy volunteered to carry a message to a neighboring French battalion and also took the message from there to division headquarters, through heavy shell, machine gun fire and sniper fire.

His peg leg was the result of carrying a message to a neighboring battalion. He was stabbed by a bayonet, but kept on until a shell tore away his right leg. For this service he was awarded a distinguished service cross and a second croix de guerre.

With the other members of the orchestra now being formed Kennedy intends to make his living in the future by music.
