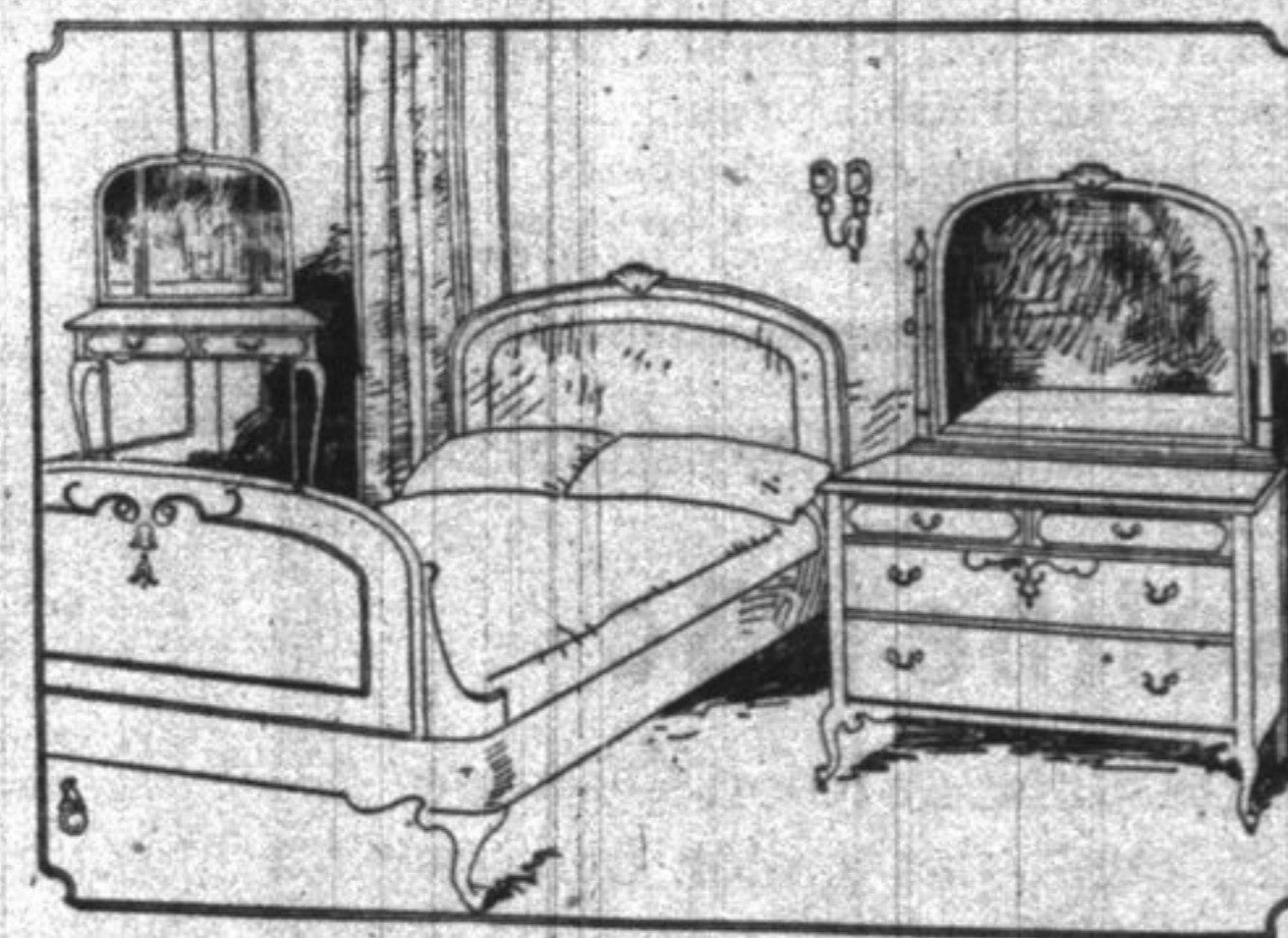

TEACHERS IN DISTRICT 108 GIVEN INCREASE

HAVE BEEN UNDERPAID

Big Shortage of Teachers S Instructors Attracted by Higher Salaries in Other Capacities

On Monday night, Nov. 17, a special meeting of the Board of Education for the 108th district was held to consider the question of increasing salaries for teachers. The result of the meeting was an increase of twenty per cent, an increase which the Board felt wholly justified in making.

In the face of the present pay the teachers are not, even now, getting any more, if as much, as the five years ago, and it is fortunate indeed that school boards are aware of this fact. This whole country is confronted with a shortage of teachers the like of which was known before. The teachers are being attracted by higher salaries in other lines of work, and year by year the percentage of young people preparing for teaching as their work is falling off to a very small degree. It is a commercial age, an age in which large sums are for skilled workers of all kinds produce a greater output of material products. If the education children of this country is to be guarded by intelligent people a thing of paramount importance salaries of teachers everywhere have to be increased to such a degree that the class of teachers capable of moulding the plastic minds of young will be attracted to the profession.
