

AWARD CONTRACT FOR NEW MASONIC TEMPLE

Waukegan Masons Expect to be in Their New \$175,000.00 Home by Next August

The building committee for the new \$175,000 Masonic Temple at Waukegan Friday night let the contract for the masonry and carpentry to John A. Southerland, a Waukegan contractor, for \$98,700, there being a number of Waukegan and Chicago bidders. The committee will soon take bids on some of the sub-contracts such as heating, lighting, glazing, plastering and decorating.

Ground will be broken at once and every effort made to have the temple completed by August 15, 1920.

There will be a special ceremony when the ground is broken and the turning of the first spadeful of earth will be witnessed by a large percentage of the members and visitors.

A large percentage of the money for the project has already been raised and they expect to have no incumbrance when they begin occupancy of the temple.
