Manager of Local Telegraph Office Announces Resumption of Good European Service

Manager A. Z. Hederman of the Highland Park Western Union telegraph office, states that it is now possible to send messages direct from here to Antwerp and other Belgian cities.

Communication with Belgium has been cut off since the fall of 1914. It was also stated that much better service is now possible between America and other European cities, although direct connections have not yet been made.
