SENOR IBANEZ MAKES INITIAL APPEARANCE
Author of "The Four Horsemen" at Recital Hall, Fine Arts Bldg., Chicago Sunday Evening

The author of The Four Horsemen made his initial appearance in Chicago at Recital Hall, Fine Arts Building, last Sunday evening. Although the lecture was widely announced to the general public, it was given under the auspices of the Spanish Society in Chicago, and the great majority of the audience was made up of Spanish people.
Senor Ibanez was introduced in Spanish while those who understood not a word of the language were wondering whether the noted man would make his address in this tongue. They were soon relieved, however, of any doubts on that matter when the speaker announced that, for the sake of those who were not familiar with the Spanish language, an interpreter would give the first third of the lecture in English after which Senor Ibanez would repeat the same in Spanish, the interpreter leading again with the second third, followed by the author, and so on until the lecture was finished.
Senor Ibanez said that nothing he had ever seen had so impressed him as the dazzling spectacle of New York City, with its splendor, its lights, its Babel towers of brick and steel which defy the very heavens. The electric display there at night had so bewildered his imagination by its audacity of device that it took on a stellar magnificence. America is a wonder-land, an El Dorado which surpasses the wildest fancy of a dreamer's dreams, in the opinion of Senor Ibanez.
President Wilson is a poet, the greatest living today. Although he does not write poetry, he has the vision, he lives above and beyond the common life of man. He is a seer in the true sense. Often has the author seen him in a vision, as one who is greatly misunderstood because so far above the ordinary conception of mankind. At these times he has wings which grow from his shoulder blades, and those angel wings drag on the ground, as he walks familiarly in the dust of his generation, and the surging populace place heedless feet on these wings, ignorant of what they do.
Ibanez spoke with great force and eloquence. Those who heard him, and did not understand the Spanish language, were sorely regretful of this fact, just as the author himself expressed his deep regret that he had never learned the English language.
