GLENCOE TO ADOPT CITY BEAUTIFUL PLAN

 fund and providing for the appointment of a committee to administer this fund. One member of the committee was appointed by each of the public bodies of Glencoe. It is known as the Community Center Plan commission. The members are: Sherman M. Booth, chairman; Markham B. Orde, J. Fred McGuire, Bruce McLeish, Otto R. Barnett, Mrs. Alfred Washington, Fred A. Sager and Herbert H. Sherer.
George W. Maher Draws Plans.
 The commission's first step was to have architect George W. Maher, who laid out Kenilworth, work out a village plan for Glencoe. In addition to planning the community center, Mr. Maher is studying the development of the village with regard to the forest preserve properties northwest of the village and the Skokie marsh on the west. New roadways will be laid out and old ones rearranged. More parks will be laid out and boulevards to connect them. Attractive street signs and lamp posts will be designed. Every civic body in Glencoe is back of the present plan. And practically every citizen is enthusiastic over what is going to be done.

Glencoe, of course, isn't the first Chicago suburb to go in for beautification and betterment. Riverside was laid out before the Chicago fire by a world-famous landscape architect. Kenilworth was the next suburb to make an attempt at self-beautification and Mr. Maher brought results which have made Kenilworth noteworthy.
 Years later Jarvis Hunt did his best to camouflage the unsightly business district of Wheaton into a typical English village, but property owners disagreed and the plan was abandoned.

What Lake Forest Did.
 In 1916 some Lake Forest citizens commissioned Howard Shaw to make the town's business district live up to the reputation of the residence section as containing more millionaires to the square mile than any Chicago suburb. In about nine months Lake Foresters actually could point with pride to their shops.
 Winnetka also has beautification plans on foot and will co-operate with Glencoe in its work at certain points where the two villages' development ideas agree.

Vast Waste Desert.
 The great Sahara desert covers the major part of northern Africa, consisting of 3,500,000 square miles—an arid region as large as the whole of Europe. From 100 feet below sea level it rises in one instance to 8,000 feet above, and some of its elevations are covered with snow for three months of the year. Most of it, however, is a dry, sandy waste, dotted here and there with an oasis where "drink" may be secured. The winds are all very hot and dry, while rain is almost unknown.

Song-Loving Mocking Bird.
 Many bird lovers who are now permanent residents of Florida, but who spent their early youth in the North, claim that the varied song of the mocking bird fully compensates them for the lack of the robin, the song sparrow, the oriole and other songsters that they were accustomed to hear and see among the orchards and hills of their Northern homes. The mocking bird in the South really fills the place in one's affections that the robin holds in the north.
