PUBLIC LIBRARY

"A Forty Years Friendship" is something too wonderful to contemplate, and a friendship of that duration between a man and a woman is one of the rare and not-to-be-ignored wonders of the world. Best told by the letters between the friends, the friendship offers us a book which many will want to read for as many different reasons. The remarkable correspondence between H. Scott Holland, Canon of St. Paul's Cathedral, one of England's greatest pulpit orators, and Mrs. Drew, nee Mary Gladstone, the daughter of England's celebrated statesman, W. E. Gladstone, proves the old saying that to have a truly great friendship the friends must be truly great.

Dancing, like some of the other arts, has often brought upon itself and its devotees great criticism. And likewise has been exaggerated, or vulgarized, so that it is little wonder. But dancing, when dignified and graceful, may be one of the most beautiful of all arts, and also a most healthful exercise. The demand for books on dancing is met by the following new books in the Public Library: Charles Coll's "Dancing Made Easy" is a simple explanation of ballroom dancing. It is illustrated in an equally simple manner, with pictures of the dancers, beneath which are diagrams of the positions of the feet. The reason for writing the book, the author gives: "Clean, wholesome play, temperate and healthful relaxation is the infallible way of dissolving the mental and physical toxins generated by our intense American way of living and working. Dancing is the perfectly natural and soundly reasonable way to open your play." Principles of posture and a graceful walk are some of the subjects in addition to dancing which Chalif, the famous Russian teacher of dancing teaches in his excellent "Text Book of Dancing." This volume gives dances for public school, playground and community teachers and dancing. To anyone who has an interest in figure dancing folk-dancing and the Russian ballet, Chalif's book will be more than a passing interest. His prefatory remarks about walking are worth reading. "To walk well is very important, because doing so brings a graceful carriage, the implication of strength and personality. An ungraceful walk is a great defect, for it destroys the air of perfect elegance which the dancer must throw about him. As a man walks, so will he dance. In the Russian Ballet school the child candidates for admission are chosen solely by their walk." Have you seen the Russian Ballet with your Chicago opera?

"Dancing, Ancient and Modern," by Ethel L. Urlih is still another aspect of the dance, taking up the subject from a historic point of view, comparing primitive, antique and modern

dances. It describes various European dances, Spanish and Slavonic, Gypsy dances and the dance in Italy, those of China, Japan and Ireland. The Morris dance, the Hindu dance, and the latest developments of the modern dance are all most attractively given. One of the illustrations of note is Pavlova in her "Dance of the Swans."

"Rhythmic Games and Dances for Children" by Mrs. Florence Kirk includes music, directions for executing the dance, and small illustrations from photographs. These include games for children under five; games without music; Old English games and dances; Swedish games and dances; various marches and steps. So near to each other are the games, marches and dances in the folk-dances, that the line of separation is at times hard to distinguish. The fame of such Swedish exercise is immortal.

Make your New Year resolution now, to use your Public Library, and keep to it.
