POISONING CAUSES DEATH OF CHILD

Acute Colitis, Second Verdict of Jury at Inquest Over 6 Year Old Orlando Florida

Last Sunday evening, December 14, occurred the death of Orlando, the six year old son of Bianiamino Florida. The verdict at the inquest held at Prior's undertaking parlors at ten o'clock Monday morning was that the cause of the child's death was intestinal poison following the eating of some mixed candy. Several of the jurors were not satisfied with their verdict so another meeting was held Tuesday at 10 at which Coroner Taylor and three Highland Park physicians were present. They decided that the death resulted from acute colitis.

The funeral services were held at the Immaculate Conception Church, Dr. O'Neill officiating. Burial was made at St. Mary's cemetery.
