**ICE COMPANIES TO
QUIT LAKE COUNTY**

No Attempt Will Be Made to Fill the Ice Houses on Our Numerous Lakes This Winter

There will be less ice harvested in Lake County this winter than ever before with the possible exception of last winter when there was practically none. One of the reasons is that men are scarce and those that can be obtained demand big wages. Consequently the ice companies assert that they can manufacture ice cheaper than they can harvest it. The big artificial ice plant which is being erected in Waukegan will make that city independent of natural ice.

One of the biggest winter industries of Lake County is passing and it is declared that within a very few years the ice harvest in Lake county will be nothing but an ill-scented memory. The big Chicago companies are not going to cut ice on Lake County lakes this year. Only a few of the minor ice houses in the county will be opened and the great supply of ice which has come from Lake county in former years will be supplied from plants in Chicago which will manufacture the ice.

The harvest began last week but is going to be greatly restricted. The Consumers Ice company, which has houses on many of the lakes of this county, has already announced that it is cheaper to make the ice than to harvest it from the lakes.
