

WINTER WORK OF THE ARDEN SHORE CAMP

Edwin C. Davis Tells of the Need for the Undernourished of Chicago

It is the sincere wish of the Arden Shore association to bring before the public some idea of the extent of the work which the winter encampment is undertaking. In addition to this, they are also desirous of showing up this work in the light of what others, indirectly affected by the work, may

In this connection, the following letter from the president of the Board of Education of Chicago addressed to the president of the Arden Shore association, is very illuminating: Mrs. Charles H. Thorne,

President, Arden Shore Association, My Dear Mrs. Thorne:

A serious problem confronts the Board of Education, and one which we believe your Association could render a valuable service in solving.

Under the provisions of the excel-

lent Illinois Child Labor Law, the Board of Education maintains in the school system a Certificate Bureau where boys and girls of fourteen years of age must apply for a certificate to permit them to secure positions until they are sixteen years of age. May of these children are so physically handicapped and show such evident signs of under nourishment that it is impossible, under the provisions of the law, to give them their working certificates until they can be built up to a normal condition of health and vigor. These children come, of course, from the very poorest families in the city and even the small amount of wages these children can contribute to the family budget is desperately needed. In refusing the certificates no adequate solution is found because the child returns to the very conditions in physical environment and home life which created his disability. These children are, moreover, the workmen of the future and economic necessity demands that they be saved for a life of productive labor. If these boys especially could be taken to Arden Shore Camp this winter and given from three to six months in the open air, with good care and adequate food, they would, we are confident, at the end of this time be able to help carry the family burdens and be saved permanently for a life of useful industry and citizenship

It is impossible for the Board of Education, under its legal limitations, to appropriate any money for the food and clothing of these children, ut the Board of Education would be educational equipment necessary for freezing.
