There are many community activities in our city now seeking expression. There is a great need of boys clubs and girls' clubs. There is a great need of the continuance of the community dances, in order that the young men of Highland Park may be given suitable and wholesome entertainment, and an opportunity of meeting the girls on the proper basis and under proper circumstances. A central meeting place where these activities can be focalized, is seriously needed.


