

FLOUR BEING OFFERED AT LOWER PRICES

Flour is being offered by the United States Grain Corporation at low prices, compared with what the mills are asking and the retailers are getting. Good soft winter wheat flours are to be had from dealers and department stores in Chicago and vicinity at \$1.55 in 24 1-2 lb sacks. This package has been found the most popular seller among retailers and the flour is being put up largely in sacks of this weight to popularize it with consumers. The Grain Corporation, which is backed by the United States Government, is endeavoring to reduce the cost of flour to consumers by this method.
