FEW ACCIDENTS ON NORTH SHORE LINE

REDUCED 63% LAST YEAR

Safety Measures Taken by Present Management of the Road Bring About Big Decrease

Personal injury accidents on the North Shore line were reduced 63 per cent in 1919 as compared with the previous year, according to a report submitted by the Bureau of Safety at a dinner given the safety committees of the railroad at Highland Park last week. The accident record has decreased steadily since the present management took over the operation of the road and employed safety engineers to instruct the employes and the public in accident prevention measures.

Britton I. Budd, president of the road, congratulated the safety committees on the good work accomplished in the past year and urged them to redouble their efforts in the coming year and set a pace for safety work on the North Shore line that it will be an example for all other electric railroads.

"I wish to impress upon you men that I consider safety work as regards both employes and the public, the most important part of your daily duties," said Mr. Budd. "It is far more important than keeping trains on schedule time, although I am not underestimating the importance of that. I wish to see the North Shore line spoken of as the 'road of safety' as well as the 'road of service.'"

The safety campaign was carried into the public and parochial schools in the cities along the line, the report showing that 667 talks in 77 schools were made during the year. The school talks covered Racine and Kenosha in Wisconsin, and Evanston, Glencoe, Highland Park, Highwood, Hubbard Woods, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, North Chicago, Waukegan, Wilmette and Winnetka in Illinois. In some of the schools the teachers were supplied with books entitled "Methods for the Instruction in Accident Prevention for Use in Schools." The campaign in the public schools will be continued throughout the coming year.

During the year the safety committees of the company held 103 meetings to make suggestions for accident prevention. Since safety work was started on the road three years ago 1,606 recommendations have been submitted to the Bureau of Safety, 90 per cent of which were carried out.

COURT LECTURE ROOM CANCELS LECTURES

A fact greatly to be deplored is the failure of the Chicago people to give their support to the Court Lecture Room series of lectures. The winter program for these lectures was announced in the last week's issue of The Press, and the list included Maeterlinck, Sassoon, St. John Irvine, and other notable names in the field of literature. Since the days of The Little Theatre, there has been nothing offered to the people of Chicago that might be compared to that artistic venture, until the J. B. Pond Lyceum Bureau announced the fall and winter series of lectures at the former Little Theatre, now known as The Court Lecture Room.

Tickets for these series of lectures were offered to the public and announced in the newspapers, but owing to the small number of season tickets sold the engagements had to be cancelled. Next Sunday afternoon the program consisted of a debate between Llewellyn Jones, literary editor of the Chicago Evening Post, and Mrs. Mary Aldis, of Lake Forest. This program has also been cancelled, but there is a possibility that, owing to the demand on the part of regular attendants, another date may be set for this debate whose subject was to be: "Free Verse, Mrs. Aldis, vs. Old Verse, Llewellyn Jones."

FACTS THAT PROVE INTERESTING

Do you know that the average school teacher earns only half as much in a year as does a baker or a carpenter, and only one-third as much as a blacksmith, machinist, lather, plumber and bricklayer?

Compare the salaries of teachers with butchers, soda clerks, chauffeurs, farm hands, as officially printed in government bulletins, state reports, census statistics, etc., and the great difference will startle you. The cost of living has gone up 108 per cent since 1913 while the increase in school teachers' pay since that year has averaged 15 per cent. Since 1896 living costs have gone up 300 per cent while teachers' pay has increased but 30 per cent. School teachers who received \$60 a month in 1913 should receive \$122.50 a month today if they are to be as well off as they were seven years ago. Teachers who were paid \$75 a month in 1913 should re-

ceive \$158 a month if she is to hold her place in the race with living costs.

High school teachers can never hope in their lifetime to pile up the total earnings of 40-year old steamfitters and linotypists. A plumber and draftsman at 40 will have earned as much as a high school teacher will have made at 70. An electrician will have total earnings at 40 which a teacher can only get by his 58th year. The teacher will be 52 before he can have earned as much as a 40 year old soda clerk, blacksmith and butcher. At 50 the teacher will be even with trained nurses, chefs and furniture makers ten years younger.
