For some time past the North Shore line officials have been giving motormen and conductors practice along this line. In other words, conductors are being taught to serve as motormen and motormen are being taught how to be conductors. When the new cars arrive the motormen and conductors will be utility men and will be able to operate the cars with comparative ease.

The plan is to install ten city cars in Waukegan. This is several more than the city has at the present time. This means that the motormen or conductors who might lose their jobs through the operation of the "one man" car plan undoubtedly will be retained in the employ of the company.
