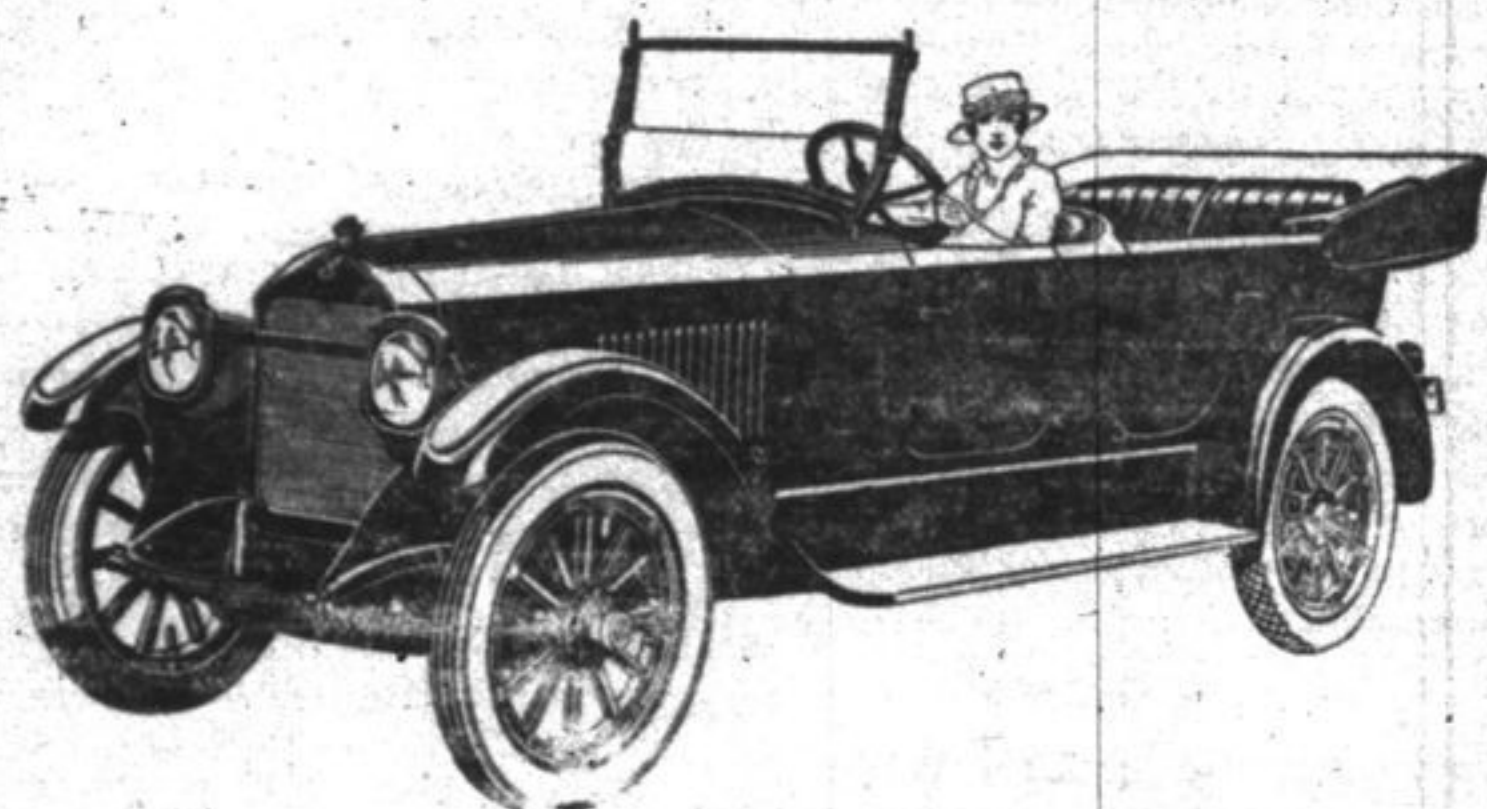

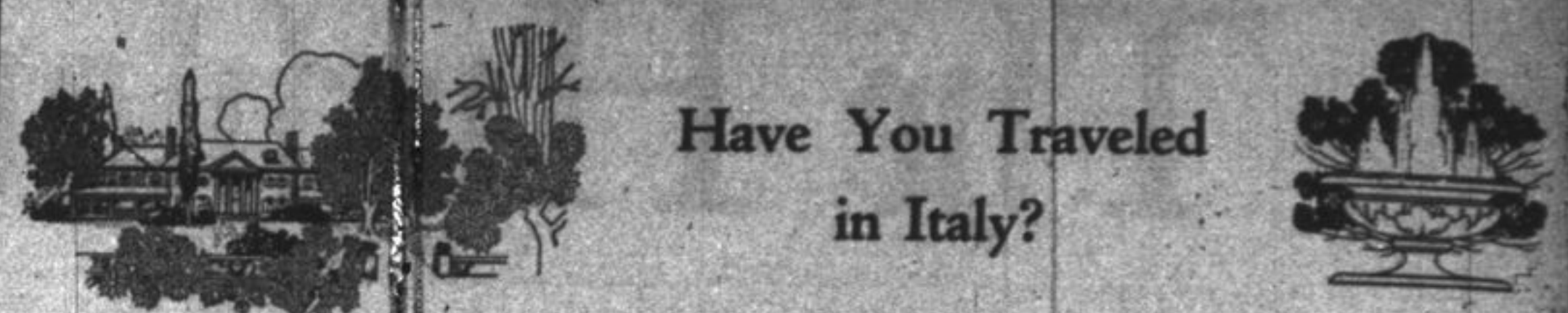
### EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN
